Message from the President

Exit Assessment

Our Specialty Board has just completed the 2010 Exit Assessment with the External Examiner Prof. Doris Young from Melbourne University. This is the third year in which she has taken up this very important and tough task. She had a most busy and packed schedule during the two weeks in Hong Kong with on-site assessment as Examiner, and attendance at various meetings and seminars. I am most grateful to her unfailing support and dedication to the development of Family Medicine in Hong Kong.

I have to thank and show the appreciation to all the Examiners of the Specialty Board under the leadership of Dr. Angus Chan. The Exit Assessment is one of the most rigorous and labour-intensive postgraduate professional examinations in the career pathway of Family Medicine. Every candidate who attempts the three segments of the examination will need at least six different examiners for the full examination, to assess his/her competency in the clinical audit report, practice assessment and consultation skill assessment. This year there were 39 candidates requiring a total of 250 examiners' assessments spreading over the past two months. Our secretaries would need every skill and patience to arrange for examiners' visit to the candidates' practice at a mutually convenient time. They may find a few grey hairs sprouting from their heads.

I have to salute to those candidates who can pass all three segments in their first attempt. It is more like threading through the eyes of three needles in one go, if I may say so.

Not surprisingly, here comes the criticism about the low passing rate of the Exit Assessment. It would be unfair to our hard-working examiners who have spent much time and energy to prepare and attend workshops, present at the candidates' practice and mark their performance according to a standard scheme. It is not an easy task and definitely not the most enviable role to be in. Our more experienced examiners were frustrated about some candidates' "dramatic" performances which were unnatural, and did not reflect their true daily consultations.

It is time to ask ourselves why we need an Exit Assessment, and what is the goal we want to

achieve? A simple audit exercise will give us the clues and answers as where we should be heading for improvement. Our ad hoc group met several times to review the education

and training of Family Medicine in Hong Kong. The Exit Examination will be one of the key areas for changes which will be rolled out later this year. For example, on-site consultation skill assessment may be replaced by submission of video-tapes for assessment. The Specialty Board has already had a lot of discussions in the planning, design, submission requirements etc before the proposal can be put forward for Council's endorsement. The importance of research has been emphasized strongly to be incorporated in the training of Family Medicine, and it may become an option, as an alternative to the segment of Clinical Audit. All the proposed changes should aim at improving the outcome of our training and assessment.

Firstly, our next generation of family physicians should be competent to conduct an effective, efficient, pragmatic and systematic consultation through repeated drilling and proper assessment. This is the core value in the practice of Medicine, especially for our Specialty.* (please refer to Prof. Robin Fraser's Sun Yat-Sen Oration 2002). Secondly, we should try to cultivate interest in research among our young trainees even at their basic training years. It will take 5-10 years to build up a critical mass to have an impact. The formation of a local and regional research network through the collaboration of colleagues working in the private and public sectors should be the way forward.

I would like to stress that all the above will not happen overnight. Higher trainees enrolled this year, clinical supervisors and examiners will be informed promptly about the changes once they are confirmed. TWENTY-FOURTH Conjoint HKCFP/RACGP Fellowship Examination FINAL Announcement

The Board of Conjoint Examination is pleased to announce the following information on the Twenty-fourth Conjoint Fellowship Examination with the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners to be held in 2010.

(1) REQUIREMENTS AND ELIGIBILITY

All candidates MUST be at the time of application for the Examination and at the time of the Conjoint Examination:

- 1. FULL OR ASSOCIATE members of BOTH HKCFP AND RACGP*
- 2. FULLY REGISTERED with the Hong Kong Medical Council* (*Documentary evidence is required with the application including a valid RACGP number).

In addition, they must be EITHER CATEGORY I OR CATEGORY II CANDIDATES: -

(a) **CATEGORY I CANDIDATES** are graduate doctors who are undergoing a fully approved vocational training programme as outlined in the College's Handbook for Vocational Training in Family Medicine.

After satisfactory completion of two years of approved training, Category I candidates or trainees may apply to sit the Written Examination, both the two segments of which must be taken at the same attempt. After satisfactory completion of four years of supervised training, Category I candidates may apply to sit the Clinical Examination.

(**Note**: All Category I candidates who are current vocational trainees and apply to sit the Written Examination **MUST** submit evidence of completion of at least 15 months of approved training by 31 March 2010, together with the application. Those current vocational trainees who apply for the Clinical Examination **MUST** submit evidence of completion of at least 39 months of approved training by 31 March 2010, together with the application.

Part-time trainees must submit evidence of completion of their vocational training by the time of the Written Examination before they can apply to sit the examination.)

(b) **CATEGORY II CANDIDATES** are doctors who have been predominantly in general practice for not less than **five** years by 30 June 2010.

Category II candidates must apply to sit **both** the Written Examination and the Clinical Examination at the first application.

Enquiries about eligibility to sit the examination should be directed to the Chairman of the Board of Conjoint Examination.

The eligibility of candidates of both categories is subject to the final approval of the Board of Conjoint Examination, HKCFP.

Application will not be processed unless all the documents are submitted with the application form.

(2) FORMAT AND CONTENTS

- A. Written Examination
 - Key Feature Problems (KFP), and,
 - Applied Knowledge Multiple Choice Questions (MCQ)
- B. Clinical Examination
 - Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE)

(3) PRE-REQUISITE FOR CLINICAL SEGMENTS

All candidates applying to sit for the Clinical Examination of the Conjoint Fellowship Examination MUST possess a CPR (Competence in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) certificate issued by the HKCFP. This validity of this certificate must span the time at which the application for the Examination is made AND the time of the Clinical Examination.

Application will not be processed unless the pre-requisite is fulfilled.

(4) CRITERIA FOR A PASS IN THE EXAMINATION

A candidate will be required to pass the entire Written Examination in one sitting. That is, if one fails the Written Examination, both the KFP and MCQ segments have to be re-taken. Successful Written Examination result can be retained for three years (until the Clinical Examination of 2013).

The Clinical Examination can only be taken after successful attempt of the Written Examination. If one fails the Clinical Examination, all the OSCE stations have to be re-taken.

A candidate has to pass both the Written and the Clinical Examinations in order to pass the Conjoint HKCFP/RACGP Fellowship Examination.

(5) APPLICATION AND EXAMINATION FEES

(6) REFUND POLICY

If a candidate wishes to withdraw from the examination, and written notification of withdrawal is received by the College 60 days or more prior to the date of the examination, he will receive a refund of \$13,900 (for the whole examination), \$5,900 (for the written examination) or \$8,000 (for the clinical examination). The administration fee of \$6,700 will not be refunded.

No refund of any amount will be given if written notice of withdrawal is received by the College within 60 days of the date of the examination.

All fees paid are not transferable to subsequent examinations.

Diploma in Family Medicine (HKCFP) Announcement

The Board is pleased to announce that the Diploma Course in Family Medicine (DFM) organized by The Hong Kong College of Family Physicians will commence in June 2010.

The course consists of FIVE modules. Modules I & II will be delivered by Local Distance Learning. Modules III, IV & V consist of lectures, seminars, tutorials, workshops and clinical attachments. The whole course requires ONE year of part-time studies.

Details of the course are as follows:

1. Objectives:

- i) To provide knowledgeable, pragmatic and structured teaching in Family Medicine for medical practitioners
- ii) To encourage professional development of practising medical practitioners and to provide an intermediate step to fellowship qualifications in Family Medicine
- iii) To improve standards and quality in the practice of Family Medicine

2. *Syllabus:

The course consists of FIVE compulsory modules. Doctors graduated from the course are expected to have acquired:

- i) Current concepts about nature of Family Medicine
- ii) Knowledge and skills in consultation, counselling and problem solving
- iii) Knowledge and skills in common practice procedures and emergency care required for good quality family practice
- iv) Understandings towards the role of Family Doctors as gatekeepers of the health-care system and in providing cost-effective primary care to the community

Module I - Principles of Family Medicine (Distance Learning)

Aims: 1. Learn concepts of Family Medicine

2. Understand the role and scope of a Family Doctor

Contents: Definition of Family Physicians, Family Physicians' Functions, Core Values of Family Medicine, Consultation, Future of Family

Medicine

Module II - Common Problems in Family Medicine (Distance Learning)

Aims:

1. Enhance consultation, communication and problem solving skills
2. Gain knowledge in common chronic diseases in Family Medicine

Contents: Selected topics from Clinical Psychology, Diabetes Mellitus, Low Back Pain, COPD, Atopic Eczema, Elbow

Mass, Facial Rashes, Health Psychology, Allergic Rhinitis, Urethritis, Urine Incontinence, etc.

Module III - Essentials of Family Medicine (Structured Seminars and Tutorials)

Aims: 1. Strengthen knowledge in Family Medicine

2. Understand the potential growth of Family Medicine

3. Develop research and teaching skills in Family Medicine

Contents: Practice Management, Care of Elderly & Chronic Illnesses, Anticipatory Care, Clinical Audit & Quality Assurance, Introduction

to Family Therapy, Research & Teaching in Family Medicine, Evidence Based Medicine and Critical Appraisal

Module IV - Clinical Updates (Updates and Clinical Attachment)

Aims: Acquire in-depth knowledge and practical skills in selected specialized areas including Medicine, Surgery, Geriatrics, ENT,

Orthopaedics & Traumatology, Accident & Emergency Medicine, Infectious Diseases and Dermatology

Contents: <u>FIVE</u> Update seminars and <u>ONE</u> clinical attachment on selected specialties including Medicine, Surgery, Geriatrics,

ENT, Orthopaedics & Traumatology, Accident & Emergency Medicine, Infectious Diseases and Dermatology (subject to

availability)

Module V - Practical Family Medicine (Practical Workshops)

Aims: Enhance practical and communication skills in Family Medicine by Practical Workshops in selected areas including CPR,

 $Consultation \ Skills, \ Counselling \ Skills, \ Women's \ Health, \ Orthopaedic \ Injection \ and \ Musculo-Skeletal \ Medicine$

Contents: <u>5 compulsory and 1 elective</u> Practical Workshops in selected areas including CPR, Consultation Skills, Counselling Skills,

Women's Health, Orthopaedic Injection and Musculo-Skeletal Medicine

Module III & V will be scheduled in Saturday and Sunday afternoons

3. Articulations:

The Course allows (up to a fixed maximum percentage of the Course units) articulations or cross recognition of previous Family Medicine training programmes that provide learning units equivalent to that of the above syllabus. Participants who wish to apply for such articulations have to submit evidence of relevant training together with their application. The granting of articulations is however, completely at the discretion and decision of the Board of DFM.

4. *Schedule:

May 2011

The whole course requires ONE year of part-time studies.

June to September 2010 November 2010 to January 2011 July 2010 to May 2011 Module II Module III, IV & V Final Examination

5. Admission Requirements:

Medical Practitioner with full registration in HKSAR

6. Teaching Staff:

A panel of experienced academic medical professionals in Family Medicine, hospital specialists and experienced Fellows or Trainers of HKCFP will be invited to teach in the programme.

7. Teaching Medium:

English

(Cantonese may be used in some seminars, workshops and clinical attachments)

8. Course Fees:

Whole course:

HK\$25,000 for members of HKCFP

HK\$50,000 for non-members

(A discount of HK\$3,000 for early birds who apply on/before May 15, 2010)

In addition, the first 10 General Practitioners in Hong Kong who enroll successfully with the Diploma course on/before the deadline will enjoy further course fee reduction of HK \$2,000.



Voluntary Experience at a Community Centre

Namaste! (Pronunciation: Nai-Ma-S-Tair, means 'Hello!') This Nepali phrase marked the beginning of a local community health talk...

BACKGROUND

Yuen Long holds the second largest Nepalese population in Hong Kong. Lacking locally recognized language skills and qualifications, around 45% of the Nepalese employees in Hong Kong are labour workers. The remainder are either working as craftsmen or in the service industry. Professionals account for less than 5% of the total Nepalese population.

To address the potential health needs of this ethnic minority, I was invited by a non-governmental organization (NGO) in Yuen Long to organize a series of health promotion events.





WHAT WAS DONE

Two health workshops were held for the local Nepalese. Both were conducted in English with translation.

The first session introduced musculoskeletal diseases related to repetitive manual labour work. Signs and symptoms associated with conditions like tennis elbow, osteoarthritis as well as spondylolithesis were discussed. Case scenarios were reviewed via video clips with potential occupational hazards pointed out by participants. The workshop also gave a live demonstration on the proper

way to lift heavy objects.

The second session included stations for blood pressure and body mass index

measurement. Training was given to a group of volunteers, who were responsible for carrying out the actual measurement and giving basic health advice according to the findings. There was also a game designed to dispense information concerning balanced diet, ways to increase exercise level, proper means of weight management, as well as information on smoking and alcohol intake. At the end of the session, general safety issues related to construction site work were also discussed.



WHAT I LEARNED

1. In preparing these two health talks, I found that the Hong Kong Government has a great reservoir of ready-made health educational materials.

For example, the Occupational Safety and Health Council website (www.oshc.org.hk) contains numerous videos, pamphlets, and booklets on a wide range of occupational health topics. Most importantly, many of these materials are available in different languages. The Central Health Education Unit and the Centre for Health Protection website (www.cheu.gov.hk, www.chp.gov.hk) also contain many resources on general health promotion. While all information can be downloaded through the Internet, printed colour copies are readily obtainable from their information centres.

2. Through this invaluable opportunity of serving ethnic minorities, I realized that health care advice ought to be culturally sensitive. For example, with curry being an inevitable part of the Nepali diet, it is not enough to simply advise the locals to eat more healthily; more specifically, they ought to be told how to make curry that is of lower calorie content. Better collaboration with dieticians is needed to provide practical advice.





3. The effectiveness of NGOs in promoting health care cannot be overlooked. Another NGO in Kwai Chung provides similar services for Southeast Asians living in the area. In fact, the organization has a team of social workers working specifically on the health care needs of ethnic minorities. Services available include blood pressure monitoring and blood glucose check for the elderly in the comfort of their homes. Southeast Asian recipes that are health conscious and economical are also offered.

It was surely a great pleasure volunteering within the community. Not only could I put my professional knowledge into practical use, but I also had the chance to train volunteers who could in turn help others. I look forward to similar opportunities in the future.

Recall of Rotarix (Rotavirus vaccine)

On 23 March 2010, the Department of Health ordered a recall from hospitals, pharmacies and doctors of a registered rotavirus vaccine, Rotarix, on the grounds of quality issues, and recommended that its use be suspended in Hong Kong.¹

The decision was made following the United States Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) confirmation on March 22 of the detection of the DNA of an extraneous virus, porcine circovirus 1 (PCV 1), in Rotarix by an independent US academic research team.² The virus is not known to cause illness in humans or animals. While the agency is learning more about the situation, the FDA is recommending that clinicians and public health professionals in the United States temporarily suspend the use of Rotarix.

What are Rotavirus and Rotarix?

Rotavirus is the leading cause of severe diarrhoea and dehydration in young infants worldwide. It is estimated to be responsible for the deaths of more than 500,000 infants around the world each year, primarily in low- and middle-income countries.

Rotarix is a registered pharmaceutical product manufactured by GlaxoSmithKline. It is a two-dose, orally-administered vaccine that offers protection against rotavirus to infants. Rotarix is indicated for the active immunization of infants from the age of 6 weeks for prevention of gastroenteritis due to rotavirus infection.

What is porcine circovirus 1 (PCV 1)?

PCV-1 is a well known virus that does not multiply in humans and is not known to cause illness in humans. It is found in everyday meal products and is frequently eaten with no resulting disease or illness.

What are the recommendations of WHO and EMA?

The World Health Organisation (WHO) has encouraged all administrators of the vaccine to carefully consider the significant benefits of its continued use in any decision about its further usage. It is understood that the European Medicines Agency (EMA) does not consider any action necessary at this point because the finding does not pose a public health risk.

Any alternatives?

RotaTeq is another available rotavirus vaccine manufactured by Merck using a different process from the Rotarix vaccine. Preliminary studies on RotaTeq, both by the academic research team and by the FDA, have not shown the presence of DNA from PCV1.

My child received the Rotarix vaccine. Should I worry³?

All available evidence, including clinical studies involving tens of thousands of patients, supports the safety of the vaccine. PCV1 is not known to cause disease in humans. The FDA's recommendation is a precaution taken while the agency learned about the situation. Children who received Rotarix do not need additional medical follow-up.

On-going progress

The FDA is meanwhile gathering additional information. The agency is recommending that clinicians temporarily suspend the use of Rotarix for rotavirus immunization. The FDA expects to make an updated recommendation in four to six weeks. The Department of Health in Hong Kong will also continue to monitor the situation, including maintaining liaison with the WHO and its various counterparts.

Interest Group in Dermatology – the 19th Meeting on 6th March, 2010

The interest group meeting was held on 6th March 2010. Our speaker was Dr. V.K. Sugunan, a Paediatrician with special interest in dermatology. The theme is "Infantile Dermatoses".

The biology of infant's skin is characterized by the specific structure of the skin. The epidermis becomes functionally mature between 32 and 34 weeks of gestational age. In the infant, thickness of the epidermis is related to birth weight, and the lower the weight the thinner the epidermis. As compared to the adult's skin, the infant's skin is much thinner (40-60%) and less hairy. It has weaker attachment between epidermis and dermis. The body surface area-to-weight ratio can be up to five.

Cutis marmorata is a reticulated bluish mottling of skin. It is caused by dilatation of capillaries and venules on exposure to cold and will disappear on rewarming. It lasts for weeks or months. It could be persistent in patients with Down's syndrome and Trisomy 18 syndrome. If it persists even on rewarming, cutis marmorata telangiectasia congenita should be considered.

Subcutaneous fat necrosis is a benign, self limiting skin problem found in full term babies from the first few days to few weeks of neonatal period. It presents as circumscribed, indurated, nodular areas of fat necrosis. The etiology is unknown, but could be related to perinatal trauma, asphyxia or hypothermia. Sometimes, hypercalcaemia is an association. Treatment is rarely needed.

Miliaria is a very common skin condition in newborns. They are caused by sweat retention due to keratinous plugging of eccrine sweat ducts, and present as small pink bumps or vesicular eruptions. Milia are tiny pearly white retention cysts on the surface of the skin that are commonly present on the face. They usually resolve in three to four weeks. Milia that are found on the roof of the mouth in infants are called Epstein pearls and are normal in newborns.

Erythema toxicum neonatorum, acne neonatorum, and transient neonatal pustular melanosis are transient vesiculopustular rashes that can be diagnosed clinically based on their distinctive appearances. Erythema toxicum neonatorum may be present at birth but more often appears during the second or third day of life. Typical lesions consist of erythematous, 2- to 3-mm macules and papules that evolve into pustules. Each pustule is surrounded by a blotchy area of erythema, leading to what is classically described as a "flea-bitten" appearance. Lesions usually occur on the face, trunk, and the proximal part of limbs. Palms and soles are not involved. The cause

of this rash is unknown. Acne neonatorum is due to hormonal stimulation of immature sebaceous glands and is usually self limiting. It typically consists of closed comedones on the forehead, nose, and cheeks, although other locations are also possible. Open comedones, inflammatory papules, and pustules can also develop. Parents should be counseled that lesions usually resolve spontaneously within four months without scarring. In general, treatment is not indicated. Transient neonatal pustular melanosis is a vesiculopustular rash. In contrast to erythema toxicum neonatorum, the lesions of transient neonatal pustular melanosis lack surrounding erythema. Moreover, these lesions rupture easily and all areas of the body may be affected, including palms and soles. The pigmented macules within the vesicopustules are unique to this condition.

Seborrhoeic Dermatitis usually has onset before 2 months old of age. It is an extremely common rash characterized by non-prurtic, oily yellowish lesions with distinct border. It tends to resolve by 4-5 months old.

Diaper Dermatitis (diaper rash) is the most common dermatosis in infancy. It is an acute inflammatory skin reaction in areas covered by diaper. The term diaper rash includes a variety of disorders of the skin. Frictional (chafing) dermatitis is caused by direct friction with the napkin. Frequent diaper changes and good diaper hygiene are solution to the problem. Irritant contact dermatitis is caused by the combination of wetness, frictional damage, diaper contact and increased pH. They lead to increase skin permeability to irritants and increase the activities of fecal proteases and lipases. Diaper candidiasis is another cause. It should be treated with topical anti-fungal.

Workshop 1: Common Office Procedures

Part A (29 May): Joint injections: steroid vs prolotherapy

Part B (30 May): Lower limb biomechanics, Gait and Foot assessment

The College will co-organize this workshop with HKIMM (The Hong Kong Institute of Musculoskeletal Medicine). Joint injection is a simple and relatively safe procedure. In Part A, injection techniques on major joints will be demonstrated. A new technique, Regeneration Injection Technique (RIT) or Prolotherapy, which is one of the most effective treatments for musculoskeletal pain will be introduced.

Biomechanics is the core of musculoskeletal medicine. In Part B, we will introduce the framework of gait assessment. Participants will appreciate the complexity of the compensatory cascades. Practical skills on assessing foot biomechanics will be discussed at this workshop.

dosage according to their self monitored blood glucose and during special occasions such as exercising, oversea travels or during sick days. Some patients may encounter hypoglycemia, lipodystrophy at the injection site, significant weight gain while on insulin and rarely insulin allergy. In this workshop, we have proudly invited Dr. Chan Kwok Wing, Fredriech and Dr. Yau See Yun Joyce, private specialists in Endocrinology, Diabetes and Metabolism to discuss the strategy of managing these problems and to share with us the experience of managing diabetic patients on insulin.
