Message from the President



Independent Practice 少壯不努力 老大徒傷悲

This year, I have received far more notice of commencement of practice from colleagues of various specialties compared with previously. Most of them have achieved specialist status in their relevant specialties or sub-specialties. However, I cannot recall receiving any such notice from a specialist in Family Medicine. Recently, I was told our past Council Member Dr. Alvin Chan will start his own private practice sometime in September/October. Congratulations Alvin, I am sure you will provide high quality care to your patients.

I am pondering why our young FM specialists are not inspired by the prospect of starting their own family practices in the private sector. What are the factors affecting their decision? What are the worries in their minds? Is it the financial considerations or lack of confidence in independent clinical practice? I really want to know. If it is the latter, then the College will have to review our training, especially the final two years of higher training.

I attended the Pre-Exit Examination Workshop in August for the higher trainees preparing to take the Exit Examination in 2011. Over 90 trainees turned up with some trainers and Specialty Board members. The Board has prepared information and briefing about each segment and highlighted some changes compared with this year. However, there were some adverse comments from the floor about the changes being something sinister.

The new criterion for clinical audit is meant to make their work more meaningful and valuable. The practice assessment is a very good exercise to improve the quality of record keeping and standard of practice. The real purpose of consultation skill assessment is to test what a doctor does behind the closed door of the consultation room. It is at the highest hierarchy of the pyramid of competence (Miller, 1990) Sadly, most of the cases seen by the Examiners are "stable and well controlled" diabetes and/or hypertension, upper respiratory tract infection, gastroenteritis, acne or tinea pedis, tennis elbow which make up the six cases to be assessed. The outcome of the consultation hinges on the willingness of the candidate as how to demonstrate the skill in problem solving or any real management challenge. The case-mix could be the real everyday work of our trainees in their practice and no one could be blamed because of the practice demography. However, if the training provider is committed to the provision of the best possible training for specialist in Family Medicine, something must be done to enhance the trainees' exposure to a wider variety of clinical cases.

Originally, the higher training was for our trainees to establish their own independent practices and at the same time complete the six years training requirement of the HKAM. The requirements in Practice Assessment

were intended to guide trainees to set up a good quality standard of practice, which used to be mostly in the private sector. Nowadays, most of the higher trainees are employed by the Hospital Authority and they are engaged in clinics under a standard setting where trainees do not have much say. The practice does not require accreditation by the Board of Vocational Training and Standards. The workload and the practice may not be conducive to the attainment of the skills and standard required such as in the segment of consultation skill assessment. I can expect more problems coming from the large numbers of enrolled higher trainees in the past two years, if they are frank enough to voice them out. BVTs is now busy reviewing the basic training programme. However, I think it may be more urgent to re-examine the training requirements for higher training.

I sincerely advise our higher trainees to contact BVTs directly to give their feedback and suggestions as to how the College can help them in the final two years training. After all, you will only waste your precious time and energy if you dramatize in the consultation but gain nothing with the well-intended higher training, and you are only undermining your future professional development right at the foundation stage, even if you manage to pass the assessment. What a pity!

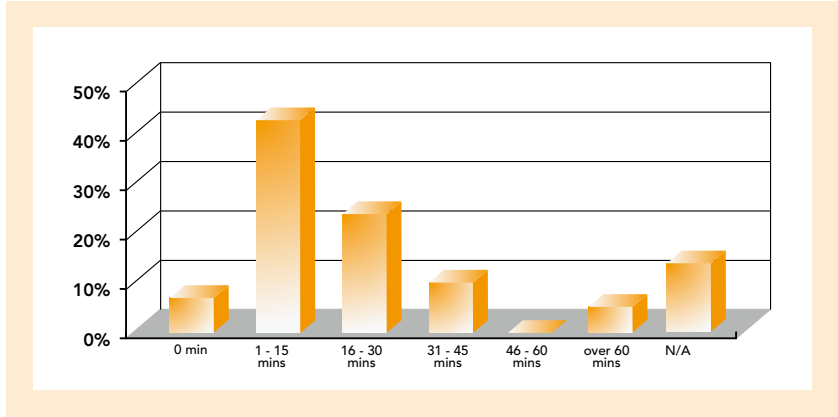

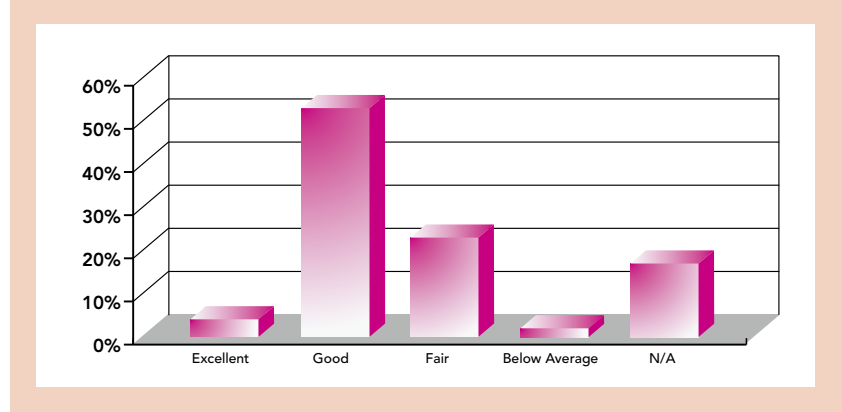
Results of Readers' Survey 2010 (FP Links)

1. Time normally spent on each issue of FP Links

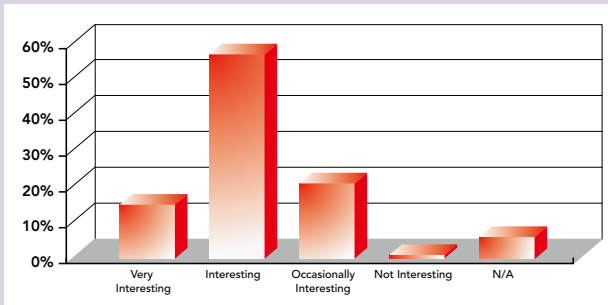


2. Rate FP Links as a newsletter of the College

History

Board of Education is one of the major boards of the college. Its precursor, the Education Committee, was established in 1978. The Committee ran a busy educational programme and arranged a whole year of functions with credit points approved by the Board of Censors. Members could also participate in the monthly Self Assessment Correspondence Programme by answering the MCQ questions published in our college journal *The Hong Kong Practitioner*. The first Annual Refresher Course was started in 1981.

In 1984, the committee was renamed the Board of Education. The scope of activities was gradually widened to include Update Seminars, Clinical Attachment, Cardio-pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) workshop, and Assessment Enhancement Course (AEC). In 2005, a video library was established and the Professional Development Subcommittee was formed to develop Special Interest Groups.

Manila Event – Trauma to be Healed

On 23rd of August, we all witnessed the tragedy of the Manila Bus Hijacking event. Eight Hong Kong tourists were killed, and at the time of writing one remains comatose and two were injured physically. We feel deep sorrow for this event and hope the victims can recover both physically and mentally.

This is a shocking event that Hong Kong citizens have never encountered, and the wounds are well beyond those that can be seen. It is natural to feel afraid when in danger, and this fear triggers many changes in the body to defend against and avoid the danger. This “fight-or-flight” response is normal but may be changed or damaged under particular circumstances. People may feel stressed or frightened even when they’re no longer in danger, which is one of the manifestations of “post traumatic stress disorder” (PTSD).

PTSD has three major components, namely “**Re-experiencing**”, “**Avoidance**” and “**Hyperarousal**”.

Patients may re-experience the event through flashbacks, bad dreams and frightening thoughts. These symptoms can be triggered by words, objects and situations which remind patients on the event. To avoid the distressing re-experience symptoms, patient may then have avoidance symptoms like staying away from places, events, or objects that are reminders of the experience. The avoidance also extends to affect psychological health where patients may feel numb emotionally, lose interest in activities that were enjoyable in the past, have trouble remembering the dangerous event, or feel guilty and depressed. Hyperarousal symptoms, rather than being triggered, are usually constant. Patients are easily startled, feeling tense or “on edge”, and have difficulty in sleeping and concentrating.

It is natural to have some of these symptoms after a dangerous event; some may have serious symptoms but they may go away in few weeks’ time. However if this problem persists for more than one month and becomes an ongoing problem, then we should suspect PTSD.

The main treatment for people with PTSD includes psychotherapy, medications, or both, depending on the individual situation. Psychotherapy for PTSD usually lasts for 6 to 12 weeks, and support from family and friends can be an important part of therapy. Cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) is one type of psychotherapy which is helpful, it includes:

Exposure therapy: helps people face and control their fear, exposes them to the trauma in a safe way using imagery, writing, or visits to the place where the event happened.

Cognitive restructuring helps people make sense of the bad memories, patients may remember the event differently than how it happened and may feel guilt or shame about what is not their fault. The therapist helps patients look at the event in a realistic way.

Stress inoculation helps reduce anxiety from the symptoms of PTSD.

Concerning medication, selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs) are first-line medications for the treatment of PTSD. It is most effective in decreasing arousal and the re-experiencing symptoms. Evidence shows that patients treated with SSRIs are more likely to have improvements in functioning and symptoms than placebo. Research indicates that continuing the SSRI for at least six months in patients who respond to the medication reduce the rate of relapse. Benzodiazepines should generally be avoided as they are both ineffective and have a high rate of dependence. Other medicines including atypical anti-psychotics, mood stabilizers, alpha blockers and tricyclic antidepressants have been used but are not well backed up by clinical evidence.

TB's Special Medical Instruments: Part III

In the last 2 issues, I shared with you the Macroview Otoscope, Digital Macroview Otoscope, Panoptic Ophthalmoscope and the Lumiview Portable Binocular Microscope. All of them are quite high tech and expensive. This time I will share with you some simple and cheap instruments, and hope that you may find them useful.

V. Thudicum nasal speculum

When your patients complain of rhinitis symptoms, epistaxis or persistent nasal blockage, how would you inspect the nostrils? In the past I used to put in a traditional otoscope with a plastic earpiece and ask the patient to stop breathing during the examination. The problem with this method is that, young children and elderly people usually cannot stop breathing completely, and the fogging of the lens with obscure the view. Also the otoscope can only give you a small field of view, and you will not be able to appreciate the architecture of the turbinates and the nasal septum.

With the help of this U-shaped metal nasal speculum (Fig 1), you will be able to appreciate the anatomy of the nasal septum and the turbinates. Of course you can use one hand to hold the speculum, and use the other hand to hold a penlight while examining the nose, but the best way to do the examination is to use an ENT headlight for illumination, so that you can free the other hand to adjust the position of patient's head while looking into the nostrils. By using this kind of nasal speculum, I am able to confidently diagnose nasal septal deviation, and am able to tell whether a patient's nose bleed is due to a Little's area or due to deeper

lesions. For patients presenting with symptoms of sinusitis, I can inspect the middle meatus for any purulent discharge.

VI. Au's bottle

After seeing this photo (Fig 3), can you guess how this plastic bottle can be used in our clinical practice?

Medical textbooks usually teach us to use a large metal syringe for ear irrigation, but this is not available in my clinic. In the past I would use a 50ml syringe connected to an angiocatheter for syringing the ears, but an angiocatheter is actually quite expensive, and I would need to remove the angiocatheter for sucking water into the syringe repeatedly while performing the procedure. This method is both troublesome and time consuming.

This plastic bottle is actually a wash bottle, commonly used in secondary school chemistry laboratory. You can also use this bottle to irrigate your plants. This bottle was bought by "Dr. Au" of my clinic for irrigation of the ears, I believe that he may be the first doctor to invent such a method for ear irrigation, therefore I tried to call this instrument "Au's bottle". The tip of the bottle is small enough for putting into the ear canal. When pressing on the bottle, a continuous jet of water can be directed into the ear canal, the direction of jet can be easily adjusted to avoid damaging the tympanic membrane. The volume of water is usually large enough for removing all ear wax from one ear in one go, so that frequent refilling of water is not necessary. Unlike the 50ml syringe or the metal syringe, you can actually use one hand to hold and squeeze the Au's bottle, and the other hand for pulling the pinna to the direction you want. The Au's bottle, crocodile forceps, and the Lumiview portable binocular microscope are the three instruments that I use to performing ear syringing effectively and independently.

This is the last instrument I would like to introduce to you at this moment. As finding good medical instruments is actually my hobby, I hope I will be able to write the fourth or even fifth article on special medical instruments in the near future. Interest Group in Mental Health & Psychiatry in Primary Care – the 23rd Meeting on 7th August 2010

The 23rd Interested Group in Mental Health & Psychiatry in Primary Care Meeting was held on 7th August 2010. Dr. Wong Oi Ling is the guest speaker.

The theme of the meeting is Working with Families-Systemic Perspective

Speaker: Dr. Wong Oi Ling, PhD

Moderator: Dr. Mark S. H. Chan

As family doctors, we deal with families everyday. While family therapy is an established discipline, most of us have minimal exposure to how family therapy operates and the process which family doctors learn, assess and initiate referral for appropriate cases. In 2 consecutive meetings, we will explore these most related areas.

The theme of the first meeting is "How to work with family", using a systemic perspective. The speaker is Dr. Wong Oi Ling. Colleagues attended sessions at HKU Family Institute at Tsan Yuk Hospital will know Dr. Wong for sure.

Dr. Wong Oi Ling is Clinical Member of American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, Approved Supervisor of American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy and Clinical-teacher Member of American Family Therapy Academy. Dr. Wong is a senior teaching consultant of the Department of Social work and Social Administration, and Family Institute of the University of Hong Kong. Dr. Wong is also a registered social worker.

Learning points:

Dr. Wong began with the introduction on how individuals related to the extended society. The concept of Self- in- context was illustrated by concentric circles with the scope of immediate family, which is influenced by the broader society and culture.

The members of family work with interconnectedness. It is important to be aware of the Linear Thinking Vs Pattern of Interaction in dealing with families.

Working Concepts

- Family life cycle
- Subsystems and boundary
- Parental hierarchy
- Coalition & triangulation
- Fusion & differentiation of self
- Complementarity (Pursuer & Distancer; Over-functioning & Under-functioning)
- Power & control
- Competence & strength

Family Assessment

1. Understanding the presenting problem: Bear in mind that the presenting problem or symptoms is a problem-saturated story & a partial reality;
2. Understanding how the family organized around the symptoms: Not looking for CAUSES;
3. Understanding the family organization and family life;

4. How it may be connected with the symptoms or the presenting problem;
5. Translation of the individual difficulties into a family problem;
6. Individual-framed to relational framed; problem-saturated story to complex drama.

Dr. Wong illustrated the topic with 2 videos showing the presenting problems of families with an obese child. The interviewing techniques, and important features during assessments, including family interactions, verbal and body languages were vividly displayed.

The meeting concluded with interesting practical discussion on relations of family therapy and families doctors. It opens the door to family therapy on helping dysfunctional families. Interested colleagues would look forward to our Part II of the Family Therapy meeting. Dr. Lam Wing Wo, a well known figure in our College, as an experienced family physician with interest in community psychological problems and family therapy, will share with us his experience with sex therapy in the daily practice.
