Happy Mid Autumn Festival!

Summer has passed and I hope you all have had a fruitful and happy summer. Autumn is the season for family and friend gathering. The annual dinner of our College will take place on Dec 17, 2011 at Regal Palace, Causeway Bay. Please mark your diary and look forward to meeting you all soon.

Integration, not fragmentation

The second United Nations (UN) Summit on Non-Communicable Diseases (NCD) is scheduled on 19-20 September 2011 in New York. The first summit was on HIV-AIDS a decade ago and resulted in the creation of the Global Fund. This Summit in September will focus primarily on four diseases (cancer, cardiovascular disease, chronic respiratory disease, and diabetes) and four behavioral dimensions (inadequate physical activity, unhealthy diet, tobacco use, excess alcohol use).

The President of WONCA (World Organization of Family Doctors) Dr. Richard G. Roberts and CEO Dr. Alfred Loh have concerns that a narrow focus on these four diseases may create further fragmentation of health care, duplication and inefficient use of resources, gaps in the care of patients with multiple comorbidities, an internal brain drain where skilled primary care workers are shifted to work on single diseases, and inequity for those patients who are unlucky for not having the "right" disease that has been targeted for resources. They asked member

organizations to contact their governments to share these concerns, to commit to the 2009 World Health Assembly Resolution WHA62.12, which urged member states "to encourage that vertical programs, including disease-specific programs, are developed, integrated, and implemented in the context of integrated primary health care;" and to commit to three key principles that were stated in testimony given by WONCA during an informal hearing in the Summit that occurred at the UN on 16th June 2011.

- Integrate, not separate. For every vertical program (such as for HIV-AIDS), 15% of funds for that program should go to support the horizontal primary care system.
- 2. Promote better science. We need better evidence that takes account of the complex nature and social determinants of health and health care.
- 3. Employ a broad strategy. Health care systems are only as strong as their primary care systems.

We have written to the Food & Health Bureau to share the concern of WONCA about the narrow focus on individual diseases and health behaviors which may further fragment health care resulting in inefficient use of resources. We also echo WONCA's recommendation to allocate funds for horizontal primary system from vertical program.

The aim of the Exit Examination of Vocational Training in Family Medicine of the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians is to examine if candidates have achieved the objectives at required standards at the end of their family medicine training. The Exit Examination consists of three segments, the objectives of which reflect those of the Higher Vocational Training in Family Medicine: Clinical Audit, Practice Assessment and Consultation Skills Assessment.

Starting from year 2012, Consultation Skills Assessment Segment will have its format changed to videotaping consultation. The new format is more reliable and feasible that could also truly reflect the candidate's abilities.

Research Segment, a new part of Exit Examination, will be implemented as an alternative option to Clinical Audit Segment in year 2013. Carrying out research projects would be more relevant for some higher trainees, allowing them and their practice to achieve better health outcomes and quality outcomes.

Besides, the Board organize the pre-exit examination workshops and standardization workshops for the higher trainees and examiners, respectively every year.

Ketamine and Bladder Dysfunction

Drug abuse in youth causes social and medical problems in our society, and the increasing trend of drug abuses in adolescents of school age is one of the concerns. According to the Central Registry of Drug Abuse of the Narcotics Division, the percentage of young drug abusers below age 21 increases from 16.7% of all abusers in 2002 to 24.1% in 2009. The mean age of this group of abusers is only 17 years old. Apart from the population changes in drug abuses, there is also increasing trend of ketamine abuses from 9.8% in 2000 to 37.6% in 2009. In young drug abusers under 21, ketamine was the most popular drug of abuse, reported to be 84.3%, followed by ice (16.6%), ecstasy (11.9%), cannabis (7.4%) and cocaine (6.5%). About half of the young drug abusers reported the reason of drug use to be "relief of boredom/ depression/ anxiety". However, this is obviously not a good choice.

Recent reports noted that regular use of ketamine is associated with lower urinary tract symptoms such as dysuria, debilitating urinary frequency, urgency, urge incontinence and haematuria. It is noted that epithelial inflammation of bladder, with neovascularization and petechial haemorrhage is commonly found in ketamine users. Urodynamic studies showed decreased detrusor compliance, overactivity, hydronephrosis and secondary vesicoureteral reflux. These symptoms resemble interstitial cystitis and are reported as difficult to treat with antibiotic, anticholinergic and nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory medications.

A local study was published recently in the Journal of Urology. The study analysed 66 young people with history of ketamine abuse. Lower urinary tract function was evaluated using the Pelvic Pain, Urgency and Frequency questionnaire, uroflowmetry and ultrasonography. Their average age was 18 (76% males, 24% females). Most of them lived with their family members. 56% of the subjects were self-supported financially while 35% relied on their families. Use of multiple drugs was reported by 81% of the subjects.

The normal urinary bladder capacity is 400-500ml. In ketamine users who were taking 3 doses weekly, 4 doses weekly and more than 5 doses weekly, the urinary bladder capacity were 203.2ml, 199.6ml and 189.5ml, respectively. Small bladder capacity can lead to symptoms ranging from urinary urgency, frequency, pelvic pain and urinary incontinence as mentioned above.

The study also found that the bladder capacity of young people who had quit taking ketamine for more than one year is larger than those who began to quit (387ml vs 243ml), showing the recovery potential of the urinary bladder. However, there is no guarantee that every damaged urinary bladder can recover completely.

The Pelvic Pain, Urgency and Frequency (PUF) Score, which has been validated in patients with interstitial cystitis, is used to evaluate the presence and severity of chronic pelvic pain and lower urinary tract symptoms. Quit time is categorized into "still taking or quit less than three months", "three months to six months" and "six months to one year". The symptoms scores decrease progressively from 7.62, 7, 6.67 to 5, for these categories. This reveals that quitting drugs will have a positive impact on relieving the patients' suffering and symptoms of a small diseased urinary bladder.

This report proved the inverse relationship between the dosage of drug abuse and bladder functions. In view of the reversibility demonstrated, it is hoped that the results can enhance the motivation of the youth to quit drugs.

NAHC Fall Prevention Clinic in Primary Care Setting - Part 2

Physiotherapists and occupational therapists provide their unique professional assessment and intervention in fall prevention clinic to manage the elderly with fall risk in terms of their physical, behavioural, functional and environmental domains.

Content of Fall Clinic

Intake assessment and intervention by Occupational Therapy and Physiotherapy

- Fall Risk Assessment Score for the Elderly (FRASE)
 - Score 3-8 = Low Risk (1-2 sessions)
 - Score 9-12 = Medium Risk (4-6 sessions)
 - Score ≥13 = High Risk (Refer to GDH, OPD PT/OT)
- Time Up and Go Test
 - Rise from a chair ⇒ Walk 3 meters at normal pace ⇒ Turn ⇒ Return to the chair and sit down
 - Increase of fall risk if the test takes more than 14 seconds
- Fall Efficacy Scale
 - The degree of confidence a person in performing common daily activities without falling
- Hand Grip



- Postural BP



Recruitment Educational Talk

- General Fall Prevention Concepts include,
 - Home safety and environmental modification
 - Medication
 - Postural dizziness
 - Exercise program
 - Lighting
 - Shoe wear advice





Lifestyle Modification Education Talk

- Exercise habits
- Awareness of postural change
- Compliance to and awareness of medications and their effects
- Awareness of environmental hazards
- Psychological adjustment and fall risk behavior modification

Physiotherapy Assessment

■ Including back, hip, knee and foot

Occupational Therapy Treatment

- 1. Postural and positional advice, shoe wear advice and tubigrip trial
- 2. Trial of soft knee brace on patient with knee instability
- 3. Hip protectors and/ or protective knee pad



4. Sensorimotor remedial training in order to promote stimulation on lower limbs



- Practical fall prevention trips on ADL and IADL
- 6. Fall behavioral education talk
- 7. Common aid prescription
- 8. Home Safety education
- 9. Post-fall syndrome education
- 10.Low vision education





Conclusion

The success of the fall prevention program indicates an increase in awareness of the importance of prevention of fall to the elderly, other patients and even health care professionals. By changing patients' focus from healthcare dependence to self-management, this program is definitely beneficial to patients, health care professionals and the whole health care system.
