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HKCFP Research Fellowship 2012

Introduction

The HKCFP Research Fellowship was established by the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians to promote research in family medicine. The grant is up to the value of HK\$100,000. It provides the successful candidate with protected time to develop research skills. Applicants are expected to have regular contact with a nominated supervisor with **research doctorate degree or equivalent.**

Eligibility

Applicants for the HKCFP Research Fellowship must be active Fellows, active Full Members or Associate Members of the HKCFP. New and emerging researchers are particularly encouraged to apply.

Selection criteria

Applications will be judged on*:

- · training potential of applicants
- relevance to family medicine and community health
- quality
- value for money
- completeness (incomplete or late applications will not be assessed further).

* Please note that new researchers and those at an early stage of their research careers are encouraged to apply.

The HKCFP Award for the Best Research of 2011

The Research Committee of the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians has an Award for the Best Research of the Year 2011. All members and fellows of the College are invited to participate and submit their research papers to the Research Committee for selection. The Award will be presented at the Conferment Ceremony in 2012.

Entry and assessment criteria are listed below:

Entry Criteria:

- 1. The principal investigator has to be a Member or Fellow of the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians.
- 2. The research must be original work of the investigator(s).
- 3. The research should be done in Hong Kong.
- 4. The research must have been completed.
- 5. The paper should be presented under the standard headings of Abstract, Introduction, Methodology, Results, Discussion and Conclusion. References should be listed in full at the end in Harvard or Vancouver format.

Assessment Criteria:

- 1. How relevant are the topic and findings to Family Practice?
- 2. How original is the research?
- 3. How well-designed is the methodology?
- 4. How well are the results analysed and presented?
- 5. How appropriate are the discussion and conclusion(s) drawn?
- 6. How useful are the results for patient care in Family Practice?
- 7. How much effort is required to complete the research study?



Each criterion may attract a different weighting to be decided by the selection panel. Genogram Drawing Made Ridiculously Simple!

Drawing a genogram is a basic and important task for every family doctor, especially for FM exit exam candidates. There are problems with the traditional hand-drawn genogram:

- 1) Need to update the age of various members in the genogram every year. Although you can choose to write down the year of birth instead of the age while drawing the initial genogram, it is actually quite troublesome to figure out the actual age of each person when you are reading the genogram during a consultation.
- 2) When you add new members to an existing genogram, such as a new baby, or a new marital relationship, you may have no space to draw them, and you may need to redraw the whole genogram.
- 3) Difficult to add a lot of information to each member on the genogram, and difficult to keep the genogram tidy when you need to rewrite the information.
- 4) Nowadays family medicine clinics are becoming more computerized. You may want to store the genogram in an electronic format.

I would like to share with you a good solution that I have found: a very user friendly computer program that can produce a smart looking genogram with only a few clicks and key strokes!

With the use of several short-cut keys, you can create a big family just like GOD created mankind! Let me guide you through this exciting process...


By pressing the letter "W", you've created a man! (And "E" for woman, Man + Woman = "WE")






By pressing the letter "M", you've created a "mate" for this man, just like GOD created a wife for Adam!


By choosing an individual and pressing the letter "S", the couple gives birth to a son...







By pressing "D" twice, you've created two younger sisters for this boy!

You can continue to press "M" to create a wife for the son, and continue to create grandchildren as you like. However, the genogram becomes messy...







No need to worry, a simple click on the "Auto arrange" key will make the genogram look great again!



Now you can start entering information for each member in the genogram. You can enter the date of birth for each individual, and enter all other medical and social history in the "Comment" part.







The genogram will show the date of birth on the top of each individual, and the age will be calculated and shown inside each individual's symbol.


By selecting "Comments" from the "Display" pull down menu, the genogram will become very informative! You can also select a relationship line

between couples and alter their relationship. In this example, the elder daughter divorced her husband all because of you!



Finally, you need to indicate who are living with whom. Simply press on the "Ctrl" key and select the individuals with the mouse, then right click the mouse and choose "New Household", you will make them live together!







In order to indicate the index patient, you can select the person and click the "enlarge font" button to make him or her more obvious.

With this powerful computer program, you can put anyone to death with one key stroke! By selecting an individual and press "X", the person will die

immediately! You can write down the cause of death, the age and the year of dying in the comment part.



To show the legend for the symbols used in each particular genogram, simply point the mouse to an empty place on the chart and press "Y", and you will get the following legends.



Now that you have created a basic genogram, the age of each individual will change each year as time goes by, and you can edit the information of each individual and alter their relationships as frequently as you like. You can also add new persons to this genogram easily. The symbols of each individual can be moved freely by simple mouse dragging, and you can move the whole subfamily by selecting all the individuals and dragging them together.

How can you store genograms on your computer and recall them during busy consultations? You can use patient's ID number or case number as the file names. With the powerful search function of Windows 7, you can search and open a specific genogram file within five seconds! (Warm reminder: for GOPC doctors who are storing these genograms in their personal computers for the purpose of exit exam, never keep any ID number or identifiable personal information in your computers. I think using case numbers as file names should be acceptable).

Are there any imperfections with this seemingly perfect genogram drawing program?

- 1) It costs money, although it is quite affordable.
- 2) When taking a family history from your patients, they will usually tell you the age of the individuals in their families, instead of the date of birth of each person. Therefore, you will need to translate the age into year of birth if you want to show the age. E.g. an age 32 person should have born in 1978, then you need to enter 1978 to make the symbol shows age 32 within it. How come we cannot enter the age and let the program calculate the year of birth for us? To make life easier I have prepared a conversion table, so that I can quickly search for the year of birth for each given age.

FDA Recommends New Restrictions, Contraindications, and Dose Limitations for Simvastatin to Reduce The Risk of Muscle Injury

On 6th August 2011, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recommended limiting the use of the highest approved dose of the cholesterol-lowering medication, simvastatin (80 mg) because of its increased risk of myopathy. Simvastatin 80 mg should be used only in patients who have been taking this dose for 12 months or more without evidence of myopathy. Simvastatin 80 mg should not be started in new patients, including patients already taking lower doses of the drug. FDA is also requiring changes to the simvastatin label to add new contraindications (should not be used with certain medications) and dose limitations for using simvastatin with certain medicines.

Myopathy is a known side effect of all medications belonging to the statin group. Patients with myopathy may present with muscle pain, tenderness or weakness, and elevation of creatine kinase in the blood. The higher the dose of statin used, the greater the risk of developing myopathy. Rhabdomyolysis, the most serious form of myopathy, may result in renal failure. Patients with rhabdomyolysis may have dark or red urine and fatigue, in addition to their muscle symptoms.

Data summary:

The recommendations are based on FDA's review of the Study of the Effectiveness of Additional Reductions in Cholesterol and Homocysteine (SEARCH) trial. It was a seven-year, randomized, double-blinded clinical trial comparing the efficacy and safety of simvastatin 80 mg to simvastatin 20 mg, with or without vitamin B_{12} and folate, in survivors of myocardial infarction.

52 patients (0.9%) in the 80-mg group versus 1 patient (0.02%) in the 20-mg group developed myopathy (defined as unexplained muscle weakness or pain with a serum CK >10 times the upper limit of normal [ULN]). 22 patients (0.4%) in the 80-mg group versus no patient in the 20-mg group developed rhabdomyolysis (defined as unexplained muscle weakness or pain with serum CK >40 times ULN). There were no fatalities related to rhabdomyolysis.

The risks for myopathy and rhabdomyolysis with simvastatin 80 mg were highest in the first 12 months of treatment, 5 per 1000 person-years and 2 per 1000 person-years, respectively, and decreased to 1 per 1000 person-years and 0.4 per 1000 person-years after that.

Older age and female sex are associated with increased risk of myopathy. In SEARCH, the risk of myopathy was approximately doubled in patients taking a calcium channel blocker, in particular diltiazem. Approximately 60% of the cases of myopathy were associated with a genetic variant which affects the coding of the transporter responsible for simvastatin uptake into the liver. This variant increases the plasma concentration of simvastatin, thus increasing the risk of myopathy.

The findings from the SEARCH trial are supported by analyses of the FDA's Adverse Event Reporting System (AERS) database, which show that the level of reporting of fatal rhabdomyolysis associated with the 80-mg dose of simvastatin has been higher in comparison with lower doses of simvastatin or lower doses of most other statins. In addition, clinical trial data from other long-term statin trials showed higher overall rates of myopathy and rhabdomyolysis in patients treated with simvastatin 80 mg versus lower doses of simvastatin.

Recommendations to healthcare professions:

- 1. Maintain patients on simvastatin 80 mg only if they have been taking this dose for 12 or more months without evidence of muscle toxicity.
- 2. Do not start new patients with simvastatin 80 mg.
- 3. Consider alternative statin if patients do not meet their LDL cholesterol (LDL-C) goal on simvastatin 40 mg.
- 4. Follow the recommendations in the simvastatin-containing medicine labels regarding drugs that may increase the risk of muscle injury when used with simvastatin.
- 5. Switch patients who need to be initiated on a drug that interacts with simvastatin to an alternative statin with less potential for the drug-drug interaction.

Dr. Shih Tai Cho is a dermatologist in private practice. During the meeting, Dr. Shih shared with us his personal experience when faced with common misdiagnoses in skin diseases and his approach to management.

Learning points:

In making a diagnosis of eczema, always note the multi-morphologies like redness, dryness, desquamation, itchiness etc. at different sites of involvement. This diagnostic feature is in clear contrast to skin disease with single morphology, e.g. chickenpox. Dr. Shih tends to avoid using topical steroid on face, and prefers to use topical calcineurin inhibitors except for the very young. However he finds topical calcineurin inhibitors in other body areas not as effective.

Scabies is one of the most easily missed diagnosis as it can also present with different types of morphologies (including urticaria), as the skin lesions are mostly due to sensitivity reactions to the scabies antigen. Always look for areas like groins and axillae as the parasites prefer warm, moist locations. A careful history taking of recent contact and family history is useful, though it is not uncommon that these histories cannot be elicited. In doubtful cases, Dr Shih recommends using antiscabies treatment on a basis of therapeutic trial.

If one finds a tinea infection of hands and feet difficult to treat, always think of the alternative diagnosis of pompholyx which can be aggravated by hot weather, anxiety and excessive sweating of the hands and feet.

Rosacea can co-exist with facial eczema. It can also be induced by use of topical steroid in treating facial eczema – Steroid Rosacea. Look for the presence of seborrhea, telangiectasia and relative lack of itchiness. Ask for aggravating factors like hot environment, inadequate rest, anxiety etc. The physician can advise against use of oily moisturizers, try to stop using topical steroids but warn about rebound phenomenon, and prescribe topical calcineurin inhibitors in addition to usual anti-rosacea medications.

In seborrhoeic eczema, look for involvement in ear canal and scalp margin. Avoid using topical

steroid. Use topical ketoconazole shampoo on face, scalp and ear canal. Sometimes one can prescribe short course of oral itraconazole as well.

In treating atopic eczema, empathic attitude towards both the patient and the carer is very important to gain their cooperation. Try to instill the concept of avoiding excessive cleaniness, avoid hot tub-bath, restrict bathing to less than five minutes, and use simple emollients as much as possible preferably at least three to four times per day. Adding a short course of oral antistaphylococcal antibiotics during acute flare is helpful to reduce use of topical steroids.

Pityriasis alba can be differentiated from vitiligo easily by using UV light in a dark room: vitiligo will show depigmentation whereas in pityriasis alba the involved areas will have similar appearance as surrounding skin.

In melasma, borders are usually indistinct whereas in solar lentigines, the borders are usually welldefined.

Syringomas usually only involve lower eyelids whereas plane warts usually involve other parts of face as well and the surface of warts are usually more rough.
