ANNUAL REPORT 1995 – 1996

After hosting the 1995 WONCA World Conference, our College has focused its attention on local issues. Predominantly, the major part of our work involved dealings with and satisfying the standards set by the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine (HKAM). We were successful in getting our Vocational Training Programme and Continuing Medical Education (CME) programmes approved by the HKAM. Many major issues will require a lot of our attention in the years to come.

Another important issue is whether our College should change its name to College of Family Physicians. Most sister Colleges around the world have done so, but there are many logistic problems that need to be resolved. The College Council is proceeding cautiously and will keep members fully informed of what's happening.

The Board of Vocational Training and Standards reported an increase in the number of vocational trainees, approved training practices and supervisors. Seven trainees passed the Conjoint Fellowship Examination of the Hong Kong College of General Practitioners (HKCGP) and Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP) in 1995.

There were sixteen successful candidates at the 9th Conjoint HKCGP/RACGP Fellowship Examination and those who have satisfied all the necessary requirements were conferred their respective fellowships at the Annual Conferment Ceremony in March, 1996. Prof. Wes-Fabb delivered the 7th Sun Yat Sen Oration after the Conferment Ceremony and Dr. M.K. Rajakumar was conferred the Honorary Fellowship of our College. Dr. Ian Marshall has resigned from the College in June to return to England and here we wish to express our heartiest appreciation of his contribution to the College during the five years he was in Hong Kong. Dr. Wun Yuk Tsan has taken over the Chairmanship of the Board of Examinations.

The Board of Education had, as usual, given members a year fully loaded with lectures, seminars and workshops etc. In addition, the "Check" Programme was started in our Journal this year. The Annual Refresher Course continued to draw a full house and this year there will be a special seminar on the Future of Primary Care in Hong Kong.

The Quality Assurance and Accreditation Committee has secured reciprocal recognition with RACGP on CME and QA Programmes in the current triennium of 1996-98. Regulations for CME for Fellows of HKAM has been finalised and will commence in January, 1997.

The Research Committee has finished a number of projects and produced papers, some of which will be presented at the Regional WONCA Conference in Seoul, 1997.

The Membership and Nomination Committee reported an increase in the total number of College members and four College fellows were successfully nominated and elected Fellow of the HKAM.

The College Journal has taken on a new look with better quality and with a new mission. There are now Chinese translation of summaries of some articles.

The Public Education Committee has been kept busy promoting family medicine through the press, exhibitions and publishing pamphlets.

The Internal Affairs Committee reported a very successful Conferment Ceremony.

The recently created Computer Committee has replaced our old computer system with newer hardware and has installed Windows-based programme with lots of room for expansion.

Our College's finance has been kept in a very healthy state thanks to the able management of our Business Manager and Finance Committee.

Finally, all members will join me to thank our Secretariat staff for their hard work throughout the year in keeping the College functioning smoothly.

When Professor Cynthia Chan was appointed Chief Examiner in March this year I took over the chairmanship of QA & A Committee. The RACGP have now agreed to continue the reciprocal recognition of CME & QA Programmes for the current triennium of 1996 – 1998.

Since the Academy of Medicine has commenced compulsory CME accreditation for its Fellows, those Fellows of our College who are also Fellows of the Academy and RACGP will have to follow three different sets of criteria (some of which are recognised by RACGP but not by HKAM). The QA & A Committee have worked out a set of 'credit points' which include requirements from all 3 academic bodies. The Regulations for Award of Certificate of Postgraduate Studies for the academic year January to December, 1996 was approved by the HKCGP Council. The Regulations for CME for Fellows of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine in Family Medicine was approved by the HKAM Council and the programme will commence in January 1997.

In highlighting the Regulations for the Award of Certificate of Postgraduate Studies (CPS) 1996, please note that all College's educational activities are grouped in Section 3; Quality Assurance activities are in Section 4; and all other educational activities are in Section 5. All activities labelled with "*" are recognised CME activities by HKAM. Please also note that for the award of CPS, one of the requirement is that at least 20 credit points must be obtained from CME activities organised by HKCGP i.e. Section 3.

Special notice should be given to self-audit reports (Section 4.8, CPS Regulations). The objectives of the report is to gain insight into one's practice so that self improvement may be made as well as improvement in practice efficiency and service to the patients. The format may follow these guidelines:

A. Morbidity Survey

Covering Age/Sex Register, Disease Register, disease pattern within the study period, number of patients with each disease during the study period (similar to Morbidity Survey conducted by the HKCGP).

B. Therapeutic Index

Recording the number and type of treatment for common problems in general practice encountered within a study period, e.g. URI, gastroenteritis, hypertension, diabetes mellitus. The treatment may be compared with the Management Guidelines of the HKCGP. The outcome of the treatment should also be recorded, if available.

C. Practice Audit/Assessment

May adopt the HKCGP Practice Data Form for Practice Assessment. Please note both the person making the peer practice visit and the person being visited will be awarded credit points.

Report

On conclusion of the exercise, a report must be submitted to the HKCGP. The report should include comments on what has been learned from the audit, recommendation for improvement or change and suggestion for future evaluation to see if improvement has been made.

**REGULATIONS FOR AWARD OF CERTIFICATE OF POSTGRADUATE STUDIES
(Academic Year: January – December 1996)**

All Fellows, Full and Associate members of our College are registered automatically with the Continuing Medical Education and Quality Assurance Programme (C.M.E. & Q.A.) at the beginning of each academic year. Accreditation will be recorded throughout the year in the form of "Credit Points". At the end of the academic year, summation of the total score will be recorded in the member's record. A Certificate of Postgraduate

Studies will be awarded to those Members and Fellows who have satisfied the requirements listed below in Section 2 (and upon payment of a certificate fee of \$200). The number of "Credit Points" obtained will be endorsed on the Certificate as a recognition of performance in C.M.E. and Q.A.

(1) The Award of the Certificate of Postgraduate Studies is open to all members (except student members, visiting members, overseas members, overseas fellows and affiliate members) of the College, who have fully paid their annual subscription and are currently in practice. Fellows must fulfil the requirements of the Certificate of Postgraduate Studies in order to maintain their active status. For Fellows of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine (Family Medicine), please note the attached HKAM CME guidelines. All the activities labelled with "*" are recognised C.M.E. activities for HKAM. To maintain active membership status, a member of HKCGP must attain a minimum of 30 credit points each year.

(2) The requirement for the award of the Certificate of Postgraduate Studies shall be 40 credit points within the academic year. Fellows and members must participate in a minimum of 3 separate types of activities to be eligible for the certificate, subject to the following provisions:-

- 2.1. At least 20 credit points must be obtained from educational activities organised by the Hong Kong College of General Practitioners (Subsections 3.1 to 3.10).
- 2.2. A maximum of 15 credit points will be considered for each type of educational activity (Subsections 3.1 to 3.10 and 5.1 to 5.9).
- 2.3. The member must participate in at least one of the quality assurance activities as listed in (Subsections 4.1 to 4.10).

Please note that subsection 2.2 only applies when calculating the number of credit points required for the award of the Certificate. Once it is established that a participant is qualified to obtain the Certificate, the actual number of credit points scored will be recorded on the Certificate.

***(3) Continuing Medical Education organized by our College**

- *3.1 Two credit points will be awarded for each correct set of answers to MCQs attached with our monthly journal. The completed set of answers must be returned to the College within the specified time. Criteria for a correct set of answers: at least 50% correct.

- *3.2 One credit point will be awarded for attending each video session organised by our College.
- *3.3 1.5 credit points will be awarded for attending each afternoon or evening seminar organised by our College.
- *3.4 Up to four credit points will be awarded for attending each half-day workshop or symposium organised by our College.
- *3.5 In relation to Annual Refresher Course organised by our College, 1.5 credit points will be awarded for attending each seminar and four credit points for each Sunday workshop/symposium.
- *3.6 One credit point will be awarded for participating in small group discussion. Two credit points will be awarded for being the chairperson and/or speaker. (Please note that only those discussion groups approved by the Board of Education will be accredited.)
- *3.7 Ten credit points will be awarded for satisfactory completion (at least 75% of the questions) of the half-year HKCGP "Check on CHECK" programme (to be started in July 1996).
- *3.8 Up to a maximum of 15 points will be awarded for each clinical attachment organised by our College.
- *3.9 Up to a maximum of five points will be awarded for the submission of a self audit quality assurance report to the QA & A Committee according to College regulations. (This is also a QA option)
- *3.10 Up to a maximum of eight points will be awarded to a peer practice visit with submission of a written report to the QA & A Committee according to College regulations. (This is a QA option) (The person being visited can submit a self-audit report under Category 3.9)

(4) Quality Assurance

- 4.1 Adopting the medical record system designed by the HKCGP (or equivalent), and the submission of one copy of the record (with the patient's identification removed) for inspection at the end of the academic year. The Quality Assurance and Accreditation Committee may conduct random on site reviews of the record system when necessary.

- 4.2 Acting as clinical supervisor of vocational trainees in Family Medicine.
- 4.3 Teaching medical students in general practice clinical attachments.
- 4.4 Passing one or more segments (65% or above) of the Conjoint Fellowship Examination of the College and The Royal College of General Practitioners (RACGP).
- 4.5 Acting as examiner for the Conjoint Fellowship Examination of the College and the RACGP.
- 4.6 Maintaining a valid Certificate of Competency in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and basic life support.
- 4.7 Participation in a quality assurance activity or workshop organized by the College.
- 4.8 Submission of a self-audit QA report to the QA & A Committee.
- 4.9 Submission of a peer practice visit report to the QA & A Committee.
- 4.10 Completion of one or more practice assessment options of the RACGP or other General Practice/Family Medicine Colleges.

(5) Other Educational Activities

Apart from educational functions organised by our College, medical education organized by other institutions and in other forms may be accredited under the following guidelines:

- *5.1 Medical meetings and conferences organised by other Colleges of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine will be accredited. The number of credit points awarded will be decided by the QA & A Committee up to a maximum of 10 points per meeting.
- 5.2 Seminars/workshops/symposia/conferences organized by other institutions may also be accredited upon application for prior approval by the organising institution(*), or upon written proof of attendance issued by the organising institution. Otherwise, a detailed summary of the contents of each seminar has to be submitted. The number of credit points awarded will be decided by the QA & A Committee up to a maximum of 10 points per meeting.

- *5.3 Accreditation will be awarded for attendance of Overseas symposia/conferences, etc. recognized by member organisations of WONCA. The number of credit points awarded will be decided by individual assessment up to a maximum of 10 points per meeting.
- 5.4 Accreditation will be awarded for publishing journal articles (*) or books (*) and participating in approved research work related to the field of General Practice. Approval for credit points for participation in research should be sought from the Chairman of the QA & A Committee prior to the conduction of the research.
- 5.5 Accreditation will be awarded for contribution to College activities of educational value e.g. conducting and organising seminars, giving lectures(*) and participating as College examiner (*). (one credit point for being a moderator and three credit points for being speaker for activities listed in subsections 3.3 to 3.5)
- 5.6 Accreditation will be awarded for undergraduate and postgraduate teaching in General Practice (including activities listed in 4.2 and 4.3).
- *5.7 Accreditation will be awarded for attending postgraduate courses designed for general practitioners, e.g. Diploma courses and Master courses in Family Medicine. Award is normally given on completion of the course, unless the course lasts for more than 12 months and is taken and graded in sub-units. Photocopies of transcripts must be submitted with the application.
- 5.8 Accreditation will be awarded for participating in health education for the public e.g. talking to school children as a physician, writing newspaper articles or appearing on television giving health education.
- 5.9 Accreditation will be awarded for completion of Continuing Medical Education Programme of other Colleges of General Practice/Family Medicine, e.g. the RACGP.

For Subsections 5.1 to 5.9, the participant will have to apply in writing to the Quality Assurance and Accreditation Committee at the end of the academic year (December) if he/she wishes to obtain accreditation of the performance. It is the responsibility of the applicant to submit details (e.g. dates, no. of hours, topics, contents and speakers of seminars, photocopies of transcripts or published articles, etc.) and written proof of attendance issued by the organizing institutions in support of the application. The Quality Assurance and Accreditation Committee has the final right in deciding the number of "Credit Points" awarded for each activity.

Regulations for Continuing Medical Education for Fellows of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine in Family Medicine.

I. Preamble

The HKCGP is unique in that our Continuing Medical Education (CME) Programme has been established since 1977, and there are different requirements for members and fellows. We also have had reciprocal recognition of Continuing Medical Education & Quality Assurance (CME & QA) Programme with the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners since 1993.

We also have members/fellows of various categories:

- a. fellows of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine in Family Medicine (FHKAM(FM))
- b. fellows of the Hong Kong College of General Practitioners (FHKCGP)
- c. full members
- d. associate members

In accordance with the CME guidelines of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine, our College has set up the following CME guidelines for those members/fellows who are also fellows of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine in Family Medicine. These guidelines do not apply to other members/fellows of our College who are not fellows of the HKAM(FM). A copy of our CME & QA guidelines for other members/fellows and for obtaining the 1996 HKCGP Certificate of Postgraduate Studies is attached for the Academy's information.

II. Organization

- 1. The FHKAM (FM) Continuing Medical Education (CME) guidelines have been established primarily for fellows of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine in Family Medicine, abbreviated as FHKAM(FM).
- 2. The Quality Assurance and Accreditation (QA & A) Committee has the following functions:
 - a. to establish and monitor the CME programme
 - b. to adjudicate and approve activities to be recognized for the purpose of CME
 - c. to keep record of CME points approved for the various activities for all FHKAM(FM)

III. The Credit Point System

1. All FHKAM (FM) are registered automatically with the CME programme at the beginning of each year (January) or within six months of becoming a fellow of the HKAM. Accreditation will be recorded throughout the academic year in the form of credit points. Fellows are required to submit any proof of attendance, photocopies of published articles or transcripts of courses taken, etc. to the QA & A Committee of the HKCGP at the end of the academic year, at which time the fellow's total annual score and total accumulative score for the cycle three year will be recorded in his/her record, and the result sent to the fellow concerned.
2. All FHKAM(FM) are required to fulfil the following Continuing Medical Education (CME) criteria:
 - a. Each fellow must attain a minimum of 15 credit points in each year of the three-yearly cycle.
 - b. Each fellow must attain a minimum of 90 credit points over the three-year cycle.
 - c. No more than 50 credit points per 3 year cycle may be awarded for any one of the three main types of CME activities. (approved self-study, passive learning and active learning)
3. Credit points will be awarded in the following manner:
 - A. Approved Self Study
 1. 2 points for each set of correct answers (at least 50% correct) to Multiple Choice Questions (MCQ) attached to the HKCGP monthly journal, *The Hong Kong Practitioner* (subsection 3.1 of HKCGP Regulations for Award of Certificate of Postgraduate Studies).
 2. 10 points for the half-year *Check on CHECK* programme (at least 75% correct answers to 50 MCQs) of the HKCGP/RACGP (to be started in July 1996) (subsection 3.7) and 20 points for each full year *Check on CHECK* programme in future.
 3. Up to a maximum of 5 points per year to be awarded for the submission of self-audit quality assurance reports according to college regulations. (subsection 3.9).

4. Up to a maximum of 50 points per year for College approved postgraduate courses designed for general practitioners/family physicians, e.g. Diploma and Master Courses in Family Medicine (subsection 5.7).
5. Consideration of CME credits for any other self-study must have prior approval from the QA & A committee.
 - B. Passive Learning – 1 point for each hour of audience participation in formal College approved postgraduate meeting (FCAPM).
 1. 1 point for attending each video session organized by our College (subsection 3.2).
 2. 1.5 points for attending each afternoon or evening seminar the (duration of which should be no less than 90 minutes) organized by our College (subsection 3.3).
 3. Up to 4 points for attending each half-day workshop/symposium organized by our College (subsection 3.4).
 4. Annual refresher course of HKCGP: 1.5 points for attending each afternoon seminar and 4 points for attending each half-day workshop/symposium (subsection 3.5).
 5. Up to a maximum of 10 points for attending each meeting or conference organized by other HKAM Colleges (subsection 5.1).
 6. Up to a maximum of 10 points for attending each overseas meeting & conference recognized by member organizations of WONCA (The World Organization of Family Doctors) (subsection 5.3).
 7. Up to a maximum of 10 points for attending each meeting or conference organized by other organizations which have obtained prior approval from the QA & A committee (subsection 5.2).
 8. Completion of CME programmes of other General Practice/Family Medicine Colleges, e.g. The Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP). Each programme must be pre-approved by the QA & A Committee. The number of credit points will be determined by individual assessment based on the guidelines of the respective colleges. (subsection 5.9).

C. Active Learning

1. Approved HKCGP small group discussions – 1 point for participation, 2 points for being speaker/chairman (subsection 3.6).
2. In addition to the points awarded for attendance, at FCAPM an additional 1 point for being the chairman or moderator and an additional 3 points for being the speaker/presenter or group discussion leader/facilitator in any of the meetings and conferences mentioned above in sections B. (subsection 5.5).
3. Up to maximum of 10 points for being an examiner in the Conjoint HKCGP/FRACGP Fellowship Examination. (subsection 5.5).
4. Publications (subsection 5.4):
 - a. Up to a maximum of 10 points for publishing each journal article in indexed or refereed journals or journals published by the Academy or its constituent Colleges.
 - b. Up to a maximum of 10 points for publishing a medical book or a thesis.
 - c. Up to a maximum of 5 points for publishing each journal article in other journals or predications not mentioned above with prior approval from the QA & A Committee.
5. Up to a maximum of 10 points for completing each clinical skill training course organized by HKCGP (subsection 3.8).
6. Up to maximum of 8 points per year for submitting a written report on a peer audit visit according to College regulations (subsection 3.10).

IV. Failure to comply with CME guidelines

Any FHKAM (FM) who fails to fulfil the requirements at the end of the three-yearly cycle will be reported to the HKAM Education Committee which may consider recommending suspension of fellowship to the HKAM Council. Under exceptional circumstances, if a fellow cannot complete the minimal 15 points annual CME requirement, he/she may, with approval from the QA & A committee, make up the shortfall within the three-year cycle.

* Please note that this programme will commence on January 1997.

A research workshop was held in March 1995. Professor Tony Dixon, Head of General Practice Unit, University of Hong Kong, spoke about research in general practice and commented on research projects presented during the workshop.

-
- The clinical guideline on Low Back Pain was published in 1995 (The Hong Kong Practitioner 1995; 17(11):546-550). Another guideline on Dyspepsia is under preparation.
 - The data of the 1994 Hong Kong Morbidity Survey has been further analysed. The paper on "Changing Morbidity Pattern in Primary Care in Hong Kong" was presented as poster display at the International Hospital Federation Pan Regional Conference in April 1996. The paper has also been revised and submitted to the Journal of Public Health for consideration for publication.
 - The paper on "Seasonal Variation in Morbidity Pattern" has been written for publication.
 - A paper on "Comparison of general practice morbidity pattern between public and private sector" is under preparation.
 - The joint research project with Hong Kong Continence Society on "Prevalence of Lower Urinary Tract Symptoms and Urinary Incontinence in Primary Care" has been completed. Results were presented in our College's lunch time Seminar and the Hong Kong Continence Society Annual Scientific Meeting. A report has been prepared and the results will also be submitted to various journals for publication.
 - We are now conducting a focus group study on "GP's need for CME" as a joint research project with the Department of Community and Family Medicine, CUHK. COMPUTER COMMITTEE

Computer is an important component of an office. The system our College was using was over 5 years old and it cannot meet the requirement of the present operation of the College. The need for a new system becomes more obvious with the need of keeping the records of CME program for Fellows of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine & the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners. A program to upgrade the hardware & software of the computer system was started from the early part of 1996.

The new membership was changed in February, 1996. We now have six IBM 486 computer with a Pentium based server. Another 486 machine was used as fax server to offer multi-fax ability. There are four options of output: 2 Laser printers are used for printing document and letters, 1 dot matrix printer for printing label and 1 colour inkjet printer for colour output.

The software program will be implemented in mid-October which is a Windows-based program and should be able to meet the need of the College with adequate potential to expand. Application softwares were also changed to Windows-based to facilitate the work of our staff. We are also in the stage of printing our own certificate for most of the occasions.

Early this year the College has considered the possibility of setting up a homepage in the Internet. It was decided that the College was not ready for this endeavour at the moment.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

After the conclusion of the WONCA 1995 World Conference, the College received over two million Hong Kong dollars of the excess from the conference. Most of the excess was transferred to the HKCGP Foundation Fund. This is a tax exempted account, which receives donation and its main purpose is to support the training and educational activities of our College.

The Committee had also approved to use half a million Hong Kong dollars to improve our College premises. The College has renovated the office; replaced some of the air-conditioners; installed a new computer system, which are essential to meet the increasing workload.

The expense of the College increases every year. This is not only due to inflation, but also the improvement of our services and increase in demand from our members, particularly Continuing Medical Education activities. The increased expense is subsidised by the generous support from pharmaceutical companies. The Committee will continue to make appropriate use of the limited resources in order to maintain a balanced budget.

Finally, the Committee wishes to thank Miss Eva Wong, our Executive Secretary, and Ho and Ho & Company, our Honorary Auditor, for their advice and services.

HONORARY TREASURER'S REPORT

To ensure smooth running of the College, the financial accounts of our College are managed under three separate companies, namely HKCGP; HKCGP Education Ltd.; and HKCGP Foundation Fund. "The Hong Kong College of General Practitioners" (HKCGP) is responsible for subscriptions and contributions from our various categories of members and Fellows. "HKCGP Education Limited" are responsible for daily transactions of various College activities through the College Secretariat and "HKCGP Foundation Fund" deals with sponsorship and donations towards our College.

Despite an escalating inflation and ever increasing demand from the various Boards and Committee of our College, I am glad to report that our College was able to maintain a relatively balanced account for the financial year 95-96 with a little surplus. The major increase in expenditure was staffs' salary from the Secretariat. This reflected a very heavy workload from the office providing ever-increasing services towards the various College activities. We envisage that such demands will continue in the years to come.

Our main source of income derived from our members' subscriptions and contributions through examination and training together with a steady influx of revenue generated through advertisements in our College Journal. This year, the Board of Education has also provided a good surplus through our various educational functions.

Another major source of income this year derived from surplus generated from the Regional WONCA conference held in 1995. We have managed to make a surplus of 3 million from that function and this amount was transferred as a contribution towards the HKCGP Foundation Fund.

It is our responsibility to form an independent opinion, based on our audit, on those statements and to report our opinion to you.


Basis of opinion

Notes to the Financial Statements
Year Ended 31st March 1996

1. General

The College is a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital. The liability of each of its members, in the event of its being wound up while he is a member or within one year after he ceased to be a member for payment of the debts and liabilities of the College contracted before he ceases to be a member, and costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and for the adjustment of the right of the contributories among themselves, is limited to an amount of not exceeding HK\$10.

2. Principal Accounting Policies

(a) Depreciation on fixed assets

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful lives on a straight-line basis at the annual rates of 15% on cost.

(b) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided for, using the liability method, in respect of timing differences between profit as computed for taxation purpose and profit as stated in the financial statements to the extent that the liability is expected to crystallise in the foreseeable future.

(c) Revenue recognition

(i) Interest income

Interest income is recognized on a time proportion basis on the principal outstanding and at the applicable rate.

(ii) Entrance and subscriptions fee income

Entrance fee is recognized when membership of applicants have been established.

Annual subscriptions from members are recognized when no significant uncertainty as to its collectability exists.



1. Principal Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue recognition

(i) Management fee received

Management fee income is recognised when management services are rendered.

(ii) Income from social events

Revenue is recognised when social activities are completed.

(b) Translation of foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Hong Kong dollars at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions during the year are translated at the rates ruling at the dates of transactions. Profits and losses resulting from this translation policy are included in the profit and loss account.



We are engaged to form an independent opinion, based on our audit, on those statements and to report our opinion to you.


Basis of opinion

Year Ended 31st March 1996**
