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Message from the President



The Food and Health Bureau has gone ballistic since the beginning of the year. The Legco has begun the discussion on Proposal to Amend the Health Warnings on Packets and Retail Containers of Tobacco Products, and Proposed Regulatory Framework for Medical Devices. Regulation of Private Healthcare Facilities and the Composition of

Medical Council related to Medical Registration Ordinance (Amendment) Bill are in the pipelines.

Prof Sophia Chan, the Under Secretary for Food and Health, has spoken to me recently regarding the Hong Kong Code of Marketing of Formula Milk and Related Products, and Food Products for Infants & Young Children ("the Hong Kong Code"). I have promised her the College will certainly support and elaborate on my message to Members of the College.

The superiority of breastfeeding in ensuring physical and psychosocial health and well-being of mother and child as well as the important impacts of early nutrition on long-term health are widely recognised. Suboptimal breastfeeding practices incur considerable economic loss and preventable infant deaths. The creation of an environment that protects, promotes and supports breastfeeding requires a systemic approach, which includes enabling parents to make informed decisions on infant feeding free from commercial influence. In May 2016, WHO issued the "Guidance on ending the inappropriate promotion of foods for infants and young children" ("2016 WHO Guidance"). The Guidance recommended that "products that function as breast-milk substitutes should not be promoted".

The aggressive marketing of formula milk in Hong Kong has been considered as one of the contributing factors to the low breastfeeding rates in the local community. The implementation of the HK Code is just part of the effort to attain optimal infant and young child feeding practices. Ongoing and concerted actions by the Government and various sectors of the community are necessary for the purpose of protecting and promoting breastfeeding and hence optimal infant and young child feeding. The HK Code is voluntary in nature and I appeal to our members to abstain from giving out formula milk samples and not to sell breast-milk substitutes in the clinic.

To kick start the 40th Anniversary celebration, the Public Education Committee has already coordinated 2 programmes starting this month. The TV programme 'My Family Doctor 2017' (升級家庭醫生), jointly produced by Radio Television Hong Kong, Primary Care Office of Department of Health and our College will be shown on RTHK TV Channel 31 in March 2017. The programme will show clips of the previous TV drama 'My Family Doctor' and 'My Family Doctor II'. Our College representatives with other invited healthcare professionals and presenter Mr. Wong He (王喜) will have discussion forum on various healthcare topics related to the episodes and will enhance the audiences with more knowledge on management and prevention of these common problems. Secondly, the quarterly public health education programme will have the first outing on Saturday 25th March 2017 at The Boys' & Girls' Clubs Association of Hong Kong in Wanchai. Dr. Ngan Po Lun will talk on allergic rhinitis and asthma, and Dr. Au Chi Lap is tasked with cardiovascular health. Please put up the poster in your clinic and encourage your patients to attend.

Finally, if you can spare the Saturday on 25th March, please join us at Primary Care Research Symposium 2017 - Implementing Quality in Primary Care at HKU. The symposium will feature a keynote presentation by the 2017 HKCFP Visiting Professor in Family Medicine at HKU, Professor Martin Roland. As Emeritus Professor of Health Services Research, University of Cambridge, Professor Roland is a champion of quality enhancement of primary care who designed the "pay for performance" policy in the UK among his other achievements. In the symposium, he will discuss approaches to designing a health care system to meet the needs of the increasing population of patients with multiple complex medical conditions which will certainly apply to

Hong Kong.

HKCFP Photography Club

Visit to Hong Kong F11 Photographic Museum

On 18 February 2017 (Sat) afternoon, the HKCFP Photography Club (PC) visited the Hong Kong F11 Photographic Museum. The Museum is housed in a heritage 3-storey building in Happy Valley, where its predecessors were an art gallery and a supermarket.

Right after HKCFP PC members entered the Museum, we were immediately impressed by the astounding furnishing of the Museum - the main door bears a Leica camera silhouette (Photo 1), and the door knob resembles the self-rewind crank of a camera (Photo 2)! We were warmly welcomed by the Museum manager, Ms. Carrie Ng (Photo 3) and her team of docents, Mr. Jack Lee and Ms. Pui Pui Yau (Photo 4).

The F11 Museum is home to a grand collection of classic and modern Leica cameras, and it also runs regular photo exhibitions of photography masters. Our tour started on the G/F where the current exhibition is about the 1952 Hong Kong by Werner Bischof. We were introduced to the stories behind the beautifully printed and mounted black and white photos portraying the old Hong Kong in those days.

Then we walked up the original 80-year-old wooden staircase (Photo 5) to the 1/F where further photos were showcased. The 1/F is also a venue for seminars and talks by photography and history (Photo 6). There is also one lovely balcony overseeing the juxtaposing busy views in the street (Photo 7).

HKCFP PC members were then allowed to visit the private section of the Museum on the 2/F - the owner's personal collection of Leica cameras. Here, one can see from the very first Ur-Leica from 1913 to the latest Leica digital cameras (Photos 8 – 11). Precious pieces were even acclaimed by the visiting Leica officials. The other side of the floor is a grand book shelf archiving a large collection of photography books and Leica literature.

Apart from photos and cameras, the Museum also demonstrates the passion of the owner, Mr. Douglas So (Photo 12), on heritage preservation and revitalisation. We are most privileged to have the opportunity to chat with Mr. So who inspires us by his artistic affinity and his dedication to photography and architecture conservation. Our visit came to a nice conclusion when group photos were happily taken by a Leica camera (Photos 13-14).

We would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Douglas So for his kind permission of our visit to the F11 Museum and for his enthusiasm in sharing his passion and interests with us.

THIRTY-FIRST CONJOINT HKCFP/RACGP FELLOWSHIP EXAMINATION THIRD (FINAL) Announcement

The Board of Conjoint Examination is pleased to announce the following information on the Thirty-first Conjoint Fellowship Examination with the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners to be held in 2017.

(1) REQUIREMENTS AND ELIGIBILITY

All candidates **MUST** be at the time of application for the Examination and at the time of the Conjoint Examination:

1. FULL OR ASSOCIATE members of BOTH HKCFP AND RACGP*

2. FULLY REGISTERED with the Hong Kong Medical Council*

(*Documentary evidence is required with the application – including a valid RACGP number.)

(**Note** : All candidates are required to renew their RACGP membership for the year 2017/2018 before 31 July 2017. Failure to comply with the rule may result in denial of admission to the Exam.)

In addition, they must be EITHER CATEGORY I OR CATEGORY II CANDIDATES:

(a) CATEGORY I CANDIDATES are graduate doctors who are undergoing or have completed a fully approved vocational training programme as outlined in the College's Handbook for Vocational Training in Family Medicine. After satisfactory completion of two years of approved training, Category I candidates or trainees may apply to sit the Written Examination, both the two segments of which must be taken at the same attempt. After satisfactory completion of four years of supervised training, Category I candidates may apply to sit the Clinical Examination.

(**Note:** All Category I candidates who are current vocational trainees and apply to sit the Written Examination <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of at least 15 months of approved training by 31 March 2017, together with the application. Those current vocational trainees who apply for the Clinical Examination <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of at least 39 months of approved training by 31 March 2017, together with the application. Candidates who have already completed vocational training <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion already completed vocational training <u>MUST</u> submit evidence of completion of yocational training, together with the application.

Part-time trainees must submit evidence of completion of their vocational training by the time of the Written Examination before they can apply to sit the examination.)

(b) **CATEGORY II CANDIDATES** are doctors who have been predominantly in general practice for not less than five years by 30 June 2017.

Category II candidates may opt to only sit for the Written Examination at the first and subsequent application. Enquiries about eligibility to sit the examination should be directed to the Chairman of the Board of Conjoint Examination.

The eligibility of candidates of both categories is subject to the final approval of the Board of Conjoint Examination, HKCFP.

Application will not be processed unless all the documents are submitted with the application form.

(2) FORMAT AND CONTENTS

- A. Written Examination Key Feature Problems (KFP), and, Applied Knowledge Multiple Choice Questions (MCQ)
- B. Clinical Examination
 Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE)

(3) PRE-REQUISITE FOR CLINICAL SEGMENTS

All candidates applying to sit for the Clinical Examination of the Conjoint Fellowship Examination MUST possess a CPR (Competence in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) certificate issued by the HKCFP*. The validity of this certificate must span the time at which the application for the Examination is made AND the time of the Clinical Examination.

Application will not be processed unless the pre-requisite is fulfilled.

*Note: In regarding the CPR certificate as issued by the HKCFP, the CPR workshops & examinations for 2017 will be held on 25 – 26 March 2017. Please contact our College secretariat at 2871 8899 IMMEDIATELY if you do not hold a valid CPR certificate issued by HKCFP and intend to sit for the Conjoint Examination 2017.





(4) CRITERIA FOR A PASS IN THE EXAMINATION

A candidate will be required to pass the entire Written Examination in one sitting. That is, if one fails the Written Examination, both the KFP and MCQ segments have to be re-taken. Successful Written Examination results can be retained for three years (until the Clinical Examination of 2020).

The Clinical Examination can only be taken after successful attempt of the Written Examination. If one fails the Clinical Examination, all the OSCE stations have to be re-taken.

A candidate has to pass both the Written and the Clinical Examinations in order to pass the Conjoint HKCFP/ RACGP Fellowship Examination.

Moreover, services offered by Community Health Centres (CHCs)/ Network are featured in the newsletter, as they belong to one of the important primary care initiatives. The latest primary care news and events are reported in this column. PCO organises various promotional and training activities every year to enhance public awareness of primary care, including an event to celebrate the World Family Doctor Day.

Antibiotic Resistance - An Urgent Public Health Threat

Upper respiratory tract infections, which include acute bronchitis, acute pharyngitis, rhinosinusitis, acute otitis media and common cold, are the most common reasons for acute out-patient physician visits and antibiotic prescriptions in adults. According to a recently published survey on the use of antibiotics among medical doctors in Hong Kong, 94% percent of study participants including doctors working in both private and public sectors stated that they prescribed antibiotics in the previous year. 62% of them claimed prescribing antibiotics for treatment of upper respiratory tract infections, common cold or flu on a "sometimes" basis. The reasons behind prescription of antibiotics were mainly diagnostic uncertainty, repeated consultations, superinfection, clinical deterioration and to a certain extent for the satisfaction of the patients or carers. Inappropriate antibiotic use for upper respiratory tract infections is an important contributor to antibiotic resistance. Indeed, resistance to all classes of antibiotics has developed among pathogens. In places with greater prescribing of broad-spectrum antibiotics, specifically extended-spectrum cephalosporins and macrolides, rates of multidrug-resistant pneumococcal disease are higher. Antibiotic resistance not only increases healthcare costs but also adversely affects patient outcome.

The American College of Physicians and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has published a clinical guideline on advice for high-value care on appropriate antibiotic use for acute respiratory tract infection in adults, based on a literature review of evidence on this topic in 2016. There are four important pieces of advice as follows:

High-Value Care Advice 1:

Clinicians should not perform testing or initiate antibiotic therapy in patients with bronchitis unless pneumonia is suspected.

For healthy immunocompetent adults younger than 70 years, pneumonia is unlikely in the absence of all of the following clinical criteria: tachycardia (heart rate >100 beats/min), tachypnea (respiratory rate >24 breaths/min), fever (oral temperature >38°C), and abnormal findings on a chest examination.

High-Value Care Advice 2:

Clinicians should test patients with symptoms suggestive of group A streptococcal pharyngitis (for example, persistent fevers, anterior cervical adenitis, and tonsillopharyngeal exudates or other appropriate combination of symptoms) by rapid antigen detection test and/or culture for group A Streptococcus. Clinicians should treat patients with antibiotics only if they have confirmed streptococcal pharyngitis.

Clinical scoring criteria have been developed to help determine the likelihood of a bacterial cause. The most widely used are the modified Centor criteria, which include fever by history, tonsillar exudates, tender anterior cervical adenopathy, and absence of cough. Because the Centor criteria have a low positive predictive value for determining the presence of group A streptococcal infection, the Infectious Diseases Society of America suggests that they can be used to identify patients who have a low probability of group A streptococcal pharyngitis and do not warrant further testing. Patients who meet fewer than 3 Centor criteria do not need to be tested.

In Hong Kong, since throat swabs or rapid diagnostics tests for detection of group A streptococcus are not widely available, primary care clinicians rely mainly on symptoms and signs to decide on the need of prescription of antibiotics for suspected pharyngitis due to group A streptococcus. According to the NICE clinical guideline, using three or four of the Centor criteria for bacterial infection to determine eligibility do show some benefits from antibiotics both for symptom and for the prevention of complications.

High-Value Care Advice 3:

Clinicians should reserve antibiotic treatment for acute rhinosinusitis for patients with persistent symptoms for more than 10 days, onset of severe symptoms or signs of high fever (>39 °C) and purulent nasal discharge or facial pain lasting for at least 3 consecutive days, or onset of worsening symptoms following a typical viral illness that lasted for 5 days that was initially improving (double sickening).

Radiographic imaging has no role in ascertaining a bacterial cause. It is not helpful in guiding treatment because viral and bacterial causes have similar radiologic features. Acute uncomplicated rhinosinusitis is a self-limiting infection that usually resolves without antibiotics. Most patients with acute rhinosinusitis should be offered supportive care.

High-Value Care Advice 4:

Clinicians should not prescribe antibiotics for patients with the common cold.

Symptomatic therapy is the appropriate management strategy for the common cold and antibiotics should not be prescribed because they are not effective and lead to significantly increased risk for adverse effects. Patients seeking medical advice for the common cold should be advised that symptoms can last up to 2 weeks and should be advised to follow up with the clinician if symptoms worsen or exceeds the expected time of recovery.

The guideline provided some talking points for clinicians when discussing the use of antibiotics in patients with upper respiratory tract infection. They are as follows:

- 1. Adult has 2 to 3 episodes of upper respiratory tract infections per year on average.
- 2. Symptoms usually resolve in 1 to 2 weeks, but cough can last for up to 6 weeks.
- Symptomatic treatment tailored to patient preferences may provide relief.
- 4. Antibiotics do not cure most upper respiratory tract infections or reduce time to resolution of symptoms.
- Antibiotics cause many serious adverse effects and should be reserved for patients with confirmed group A streptococcal pharyngitis.

Study showed that an 85% decrease in antibiotic prescribing for upper respiratory tract infection and increased satisfaction ratings when providers gave advice on symptomatic therapy and explained why antibiotics were not needed for upper respiratory tract infections.

「家庭醫生伴你同行」,家庭醫學的專業就是陪伴我們 的病人及其家人渡過生命的生老病死,分享他們生活點 滴的喜與悲。「醫者父母心」,作為醫生當然會視病如 親。而作為家庭醫生,我們診症時的角色好多時不單止 是以父母心,還有是以子女心、兄弟姊妹心及朋友心去看 待我們的病人。若病人能感受到我們的同理心,這更是 值得我們驕傲的。 筆者再仔細想想,同公公婆婆「傾計」其實亦需要我們 作為家庭醫生的專業。與病者傾談是要以病人為本的, 與每位病者所談的內容不會是一式一樣的。家庭醫生透 過提供延續性的醫療,認識病者及其家庭,才能對他們 有所了解,給予以病者為本的意見。另外,家庭醫生醫 病又醫心,更會關顧病者的社交生活。同公公婆婆「傾 計」的同時,家庭醫生除了要監察他們的生理狀況外, 更會透過言談過程,評估他們的心理及社交狀況。有需 要時,家庭醫生會發揮協調的角色,幫助他們得到所需 服務如專科轉介或社工轉介。若果公公婆婆們是身心安 泰,家庭醫生也不是沒有什麼可以做的。古語云:「上醫 治未病,中醫治將病,下醫治已病。」家庭醫生着重疾病 預防,待病者未有疾病前就能為他們提供合適的防病建 議如季節性流感預防、女性子宮頸癌預防等,以避免疾 病的痛苦。

除了在診所內[,]有些家庭醫生同業更會走進社區,透過 傳播媒體及講座宣揚健康訊息,從而提升社會的健康水 平。

- 3. How well is the research designed in the methodology?

- 6. How useful are the results for patient care in the discipline of Family Medicine?
- 7. How much effort is required to complete the research study?

Each research project submitted will be assessed according to the seven criteria listed above by a selection panel. Each criterion may attract a different weighting to be decided by the selection panel. Interest Group in Mental Health & Psychiatry in Primary Care -The 52nd Meeting on 4 February 2017

Meeting Theme : Promoting Mental Health in the community by Family Physicians - an Australian experience

Dear Colleagues,

It was a heartwarming experience to see 40 colleagues turning up for the presentation.

Mental health issues are known to be a much neglected area in many parts of the world in both the public and private domain.

In recent years, there are however more resources being put into the community for mental health promotion and prevention of mental illness by governments and various organizations in some developed countries such as Australia.

Australia is a large country and challenges in mental health in rural and metropolitan areas can be very different. For example, in the Kimberley area, the suicide rate of the indigenous population can be 7 times the national average. The clustering of statutory services with inadequate resources and lack of integration with grassroots services can be common phenomenon.

On the other hand, at the national level and within the private sector, there are two notable national organizations, such as Headspace and Beyond Blue, which provide quality and accessible mental health services across different sectors of the society.

Headspace was developed in 2006 to help young people who struggle with mental disorder.

Beyond Blue was established in 2000 focusing initially on depression and later on anxiety and suicide prevention.

Within the public sector, the Australian Government has been funding for numerous mental health service initiatives. These include:

- Medicare payment for GP to draw up mental health care plans / treatment plans for referrals to allied health practitioners including clinical psychologists, social workers, occupational therapists and mental health nurses;
- 2. Medicare payment to enhance public access to allied mental health practitioners; and
- 3. Mental Health Practitioner Network with funding for formation of small groups in the community.

In 2010, I was fortunate enough to be involved in facilitating an interdisciplinary small group which comprised of GPs, clinical psychologists, mental health nurses etc. The inspiration behind organizing the group was based on my experience with the

Institute of Cultural Affairs (ICA), Practice Based Small Group Learning (PBSGL), the UK Balint Society and Problem Based Learning (PBL).

The group was subsequently named as Oscar Group (Open, Sharing, Caring and Respect) by group members. Our mission is "Our group wants to learn about each other and local resources, help our patients / clients and ourselves through collaboration in a fun and enjoyable way, subject to review and evolving over time".

It is a unique way for mental health practitioners to mutually learn, support and mentor one another. It is expected that practitioners on the frontline can benefit from such a group as they face the challenges that present to them every day.

Miss Zanonia Chiu, Registered Clinical Psychologist and Honorary Secretary of The Hong Kong Clinical Psychologists Association, kindly agreed to share some of her insights. She was addressing the problem of youth suicide in Hong Kong, specifically related to the increasing trend of young people having mood disorders. She also highlighted the importance of early detection and intervention of mental illness and emphasised the collaboration between different health care professionals and the stakeholders in the end of her presentation.

Hopefully more initiatives will be generated further by multidisciplinary practitioners for the promotion of mental health in Hong Kong.
