to celebrate the pivotal role family doctors play in nurturing mental health and resilience in this rapidly changing world.

In the concluding remarks, I expressed our sincere gratitude towards all VIP speakers and participants. I also reaffirmed HKCFP's commitment to the empowering philosophy that, "Everyone should have a Family Doctor", which is in line with the Primary Healthcare Blueprint. In addition, I emphasised that family doctors are uniquely positioned to deliver early interventions by addressing physical, emotional, and social needs across every life stage a cornerstone for building resilient communities. In support of the Blueprint's recommendations, the HKCFP is urging policymakers to allocate resources for at least 100 additional Family Medicine training

positions annually, addressing the needs of Hong Kong's 7.5 million residents and paving the way for a more resilient and patient-centered healthcare system. I then reiterated HKCFP's strong commitments on providing Continuing Professional Development (CPD) and Continuing

Medical Education (CME) activities for practising doctors in the community.

The symposium not only celebrated the service and commitment of family doctors but also set a forward thinking agenda designed to reinforce community mental health care. By championing the Primary Healthcare Blueprint and advocating for expanded training and resource allocation, the HKCFP continues to drive progress towards innovative healthcare solutions that serve the evolving needs of our society.

HKCFP CERTIFICATE COURSE IN ESSENTIAL FAMILY MEDICINE 2025-2026

The HKCFP Certificate Course in Essential Family Medicine (CCEFM) is designed to meet the training needs of practicing primary care doctors who would like to refresh or update their clinical knowledge and skills relevant to Family Medicine practice. The curriculum of this course also forms part of the well-established HKCFP Diploma in Family Medicine (DFM) course. Our teaching faculty are experienced clinicians working in primary care, in secondary care and in academia. The course has been designed to enhance the course participants' competencies in daily Family Medicine practice in the community.

1. OBJECTIVES:

- i. To provide knowledgeable, pragmatic and structured training in Family Medicine for medical practitioners
- ii. To encourage professional development of practising medical practitioners
- iii. To improve standards and quality in Family Medicine practice by adopting holistic patient-centered care via an integrated care approach

2 SYLLABUS:

The CCEFM consists of THREE segments, including Modules III, IV (FM attachment + Update) and parts of Module V in the Diploma in Family Medicine (DFM). Doctors who have graduated from the CCEFM are expected to have acquired the following essential concepts and course contents:

- i. The role of Family Doctors particular in providing cost-effective primary care to the community
- ii. The essential knowledge and skills on common problems encountered in Family Medicine
- iii. Enhancement in the consultation and problem solving skills
- iv. Acquiring the knowledge and skills in common practice procedures related to family practice

3. AWARDS/CREDITS:

- i. After completion of all the components and course requirements (max. within TWO years), a certificate will be awarded to the successful candidates
- ii. The completed modules and credits can be accredited towards the quotable HKCFP DFM course, if the candidates would like to enroll into DFM course subsequently
- iii. 25 CME and 5 CPD credit points will also be awarded by HKCFP.

4. COURSE CONTENT:

Segment I - Essentials of Family Medicine (Structured Seminars)

Objectives

- Strengthen knowledge in Family Medicine
- Understand the potential growth of Family Medicine
- Enable evidence-based Family Medicine practice

Contents:

Anticipatory Care, Elderly Care and related issues, Chronic Disease Management, Common Musculoskeletal Problems, Evidence Based Medicine & Critical Appraisal, Mental Health, Practice Management; and Clinical Audit, Research & Teaching in Family Medicine.

Segment II - Problem Solving and Clinical Updates

Objectives:

- Acquire in-depth knowledge by clinical scenario/simulated cases in our daily Family Medicine practice
- Transfer the practical skills and hand-on experience by interactive learning methods led by Family Medicine Fellows

Contents

A site visit plus scenario based training including Diagnostic Challenges on Common Symptoms, Problem-based Learning on Chronic Disease, Motivational Interviewing, Child Health, Women's Health, Men's Health and Aging and End-of-Life.

Segment III - Practical Family Medicine (Practical Workshops)

Objectives:

- Enhance practical and communication skills in Family Medicine by practical workshops in selected areas
- Transfer the practical skills and hand-on experience by interactive learning methods

Contents:

One compulsory and one elective Practical Workshops in selected areas including Consultation Skills, Counselling Skills, Women's Health, Orthopaedic Injection and Musculo-Skeletal Medicine

5. ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

Registered Medical Practitioner with Bachelor's degree in Medicine.

6. TEACHING STAFF:

A panel of experienced academic medical professionals in Family Medicine, hospital specialists and experienced Fellows or Trainers of HKCFP will be invited to teach in the programme.

Diploma in Family Medicine (HKCFP) 2025-2026

The Board is pleased to announce that the Diploma Course in Family Medicine (DFM) organized by The Hong Kong College of Family Physicians will commence in August 2025.

The course consists of FIVE modules. Modules I & II will be delivered by Local Distance Learning. Modules III, IV & V consist of lectures, seminars, tutorials, workshops and FM clinical skills enhancements. The whole course requires ONE year of part-time study.

Details of the course are as follows:

1. Objectives:

- i) To provide knowledgeable, pragmatic and structured teaching in Family Medicine for medical practitioners
- ii) To encourage professional development of practising medical practitioners and to provide an intermediate step to fellowship qualifications in Family Medicine
- iii) To improve standards and quality in the practice of Family Medicine

2. *Syllabus:

The course consists of FIVE compulsory modules. Doctors who have graduated from the course are expected to have acquired:

- i) Current concepts about nature of Family Medicine
- ii) Knowledge and skills in consultation, counselling and problem solving
- iii) Knowledge and skills in common practice procedures and emergency care required for good quality family practice
- iv) Understandings towards the role of Family Doctors as gatekeepers of the health-care system and in providing cost-effective primary care to the community

Module I - Principles of Family Medicine (Distance Learning)

Aims:	Learn concepts of Family Medicine Understand the role of a Family Doctor and scope of Family Medicine
Contents:	Definition of Family Physicians, Family Physicians' Functions, Core Values of Family Medicine, Consultation, Future of Family Medicine

Module II - Common Problems in Family Medicine (Distance Learning)

Aims:	Enhance consultation, communication and problem solving skills Understand the diagnostic formulation process in Family Medicine
Contents:	Four clinical scenarios. Each clinical scenario is further divided into several questions covering different areas in general practice

*Module III - Essentials of Family Medicine (Structured Seminars and Tutorials)

Aims:	Strengthen knowledge in Family Medicine Understand the potential growth of Family Medicine Develop research and teaching skills in Family Medicine
Contents:	Practice Management, Care of Elderly, Chronic Disease Management, Anticipatory Care, Clinical Audit & Research, Mental Health, Musculo-skeletal Problems, Evidence Based Medicine & Critical Appraisal

*Module IV - Clinical Updates (Updates and FM Clinical Skills Enhancements)

Aims:	ims: Acquire in-depth knowledge and practical skills in selected specialties	
Contents:	THREE update seminars	

*Module V - Practical Family Medicine (Practical Workshops)

Aims:	Enhance practical and communication skills in Family Medicine by Practical Workshops in selected areas including CPR, Consultation Skills, Counselling Skills, Women's Health, Orthopaedic Injection and Musculo-Skeletal Medicine		
Contents:	Four compulsory and two elective Practical Workshops in selected areas including Advanced Primary Care Life Support (APCLS), Consultation Skills, Counselling Skills, Women's Health, Orthopaedic Injection and Musculo-Skeletal Medicine		

^{*}Modules III - V would be scheduled on Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

3. Articulations

The Course allows (up to a fixed maximum percentage of the Course units) articulations or cross recognition of previous Family Medicine training programmes that provide learning units equivalent to that of the above syllabus. Participants who wish to apply for such articulations have to submit evidence of relevant training together with their applications. The granting of articulations is however, completely at the discretion and decision of the Board of DFM.

4. *Schedule:

The whole course requires ONE year of part-time study.

Registered Medical Practitioner with Bachelor's Degree in Medicine.

- ii) The Diploma is a **Quotable Qualification** of the Medical Council of Hong Kong.
- iii) Up to 50 CME and 10 CPD credit points will also be awarded to candidates upon satisfactory completion of the Course by the QA & A Committee of HKCFP.

10. Application Procedure:

A completed application form must be returned to The Hong Kong College of Family Physicians with the following:

- i) Photocopy of the current Annual Practising Certificate;
- ii) A recent photo of the applicant (passport size);
- iii) A signed "Disclaimer of Liability";
- iv) An administration fee for application of HK\$1,000 by crossed cheque payable to "HKCFP Education Limited". This fee is non-refundable;
- v) A Course Fee of HK\$46,000 (or HK\$92,000 for non-members) by crossed cheque payable to "HKCFP Education Limited". This fee is nontransferable and non-refundable.

Reminder: Submission of Application for Certification of Completion of Basic Training

To those who will complete basic training,

You are advised to submit the 'Application Form for the Certification of Completion of Basic Training in Family Medicine' and the **original copy** of your training logbook to BVTS for certification of completion of training within 3 months upon the completion date. If the training logbook is incomplete after review by BVTS, you should complete the training process within 6 months upon the completion date and the completion date of training will only be counted from the time all required documents are handed in to complete the certification and **basic training fee of next year will be charged**.

The Hong Kong Primary Care Conference 2025 will be held from 11 - 13 July 2025 (Friday - Sunday) and registration is now open.

All basic trainees are required to attend at least TWO Hong Kong Primary Care Conferences organized by the Hong Kong College of Family Physicians in the four-year training programme.

WHO's Guideline for Meningitis

Bacterial meningitis is the most dangerous form of meningitis and can become fatal within 24 hours. Many pathogens can cause meningitis with an estimated 2.5 million cases reported globally in 2019. This includes 1.6 million cases of bacterial meningitis which resulted in approximately 240 000 deaths. Around 20% of people who contract bacterial meningitis develop long-term complications, including disabilities that impact quality of life.

Improving clinical management of meningitis is essential to reducing mortality and morbidity, minimizing long-term complications and disability, and improving quality of life for affected individuals and communities.

The World Health Organization (WHO) published its first-ever global guidelines for meningitis diagnosis, treatment and care on 10th April 2025, aiming to speed up detection, ensure timely treatment, and improve long-term care for those affected.

There are several strong recommendations involving diagnosis, imaging, treatment, prophylaxis and follow up which are worth reminding:

Diagnosis: In individuals with suspected acute meningitis, Gram stain, white cell count, protein and glucose concentration, PCR-based molecular tests for relevant pathogens should be performed on cerebrospinal fluid samples.

Cranial Imaging: Cranial imaging should be performed prior to lumbar puncture to rule out cerebral space occupying lesions with midline shift, if any of the following features are identified at time of presentation: Glasgow Coma Score below 10 / focal neurological signs / cranial nerve deficits / papilloedema / new-onset seizures (in adults) / severe immunocompromised state.

Treatment: Treatment should not be delayed for cranial imaging or when lumbar puncture is deferred. Intravenous ceftriaxone or cefotaxime should be administered as empirical treatment for suspected cases of acute bacterial meningitis.

Adjunctive corticosteroids should be initiated with the first dose of antibiotics in children and adults with suspected acute bacterial meningitis. If cerebrospinal fluid characteristics are not consistent with bacterial meningitis, intravenous corticosteroids should be discontinued.

Post-exposure antimicrobial prophylaxis: In the presence of sporadic disease, antibiotic prophylaxis with single-dose parenteral ceftriaxone or oral ciprofloxacin should be provided to close contacts of laboratory confirmed cases of meningococcal disease, in accordance with known antimicrobial susceptibility patterns.

Rehabilitation

In children and adults with sequelae due to acute meningitis from any cause, rehabilitation should be provided as soon as possible.

Although meningitis is cared for in the hospital setting, however, family physicians still bear the role of **early diagnosis**, which is essential for treatment outcome. And we shouldn't forget about the **post-exposure prophylaxis** for family members involved. Concerning prevention, **pneumococcal vaccines** which not only protect patients from pneumonia, but also meningitis caused by related pathogens.



Unmasking the Appeal: Exposing Industry Tactics on Tobacco and Nicotine Products

The allure of tobacco and nicotine products to adolescents remains a significant challenge in the field of public health today. The World Health Organization (WHO) has designated the theme for World No Tobacco Day on May 31, 2025 as "Unmasking the Appeal: Exposing Industry Tactics on Tobacco and Nicotine Products" [「戳穿誘惑:揭露煙草和尼古丁產品行業的策略」) directly addressing this issue. The tobacco industry employs a relentless array of tactics to attract young consumers, not only making these products more accessible to teens but also potentially leading to lifelong addiction and health consequences.

To expand their market, the tobacco industry frequently enhances products with compounds such as flavorings and coolants. As discussed in a previous related article in The FP Links last year ("The Potential Health Risks of New Tobacco Product", issue August 2024), these inhaled additives are far from harmless. They are designed to mask the harsh, throat-irritating nature of tobacco, improve taste, and make the products more palatable to young people. The market is flooded with flavored

e-cigarette products, paired with trendy packaging and diverse options that appeal to teens. Moreover, some tobacco product packaging mimics candy, snacks, or cartoon merchandise, employing misleading designs that diminish adolescents' perception of the associated risks.

Social media promotions further amplify this appeal through "glamourized marketing strategies", introducing a range of novel tobacco products on popular platforms and e-commerce sites. Beyond e-cigarettes (vapes), these also include heated tobacco, herbal cigarettes, hookah (shisha), and "smokeless tobacco" such as snuff and chewing tobacco. These products are marketed with a modern, stylish image, replacing the "outdated" perception of traditional cigarettes and fostering a sense of "pop culture" around tobacco use. This misleads young consumers into believing these are healthier alternatives to cigarettes, which is far from the truth.

For instance, some e-cigarette pods contain nicotine levels much higher than traditional cigarettes, significantly increasing the potential for nicotine addiction and causing a stronger "buzz". Research has shown variability in e-liquid composition, with a single e-liquid pod containing as much as 14.4 to 32.8 mg of nicotine, meaning 200 puffs from an e-cigarette could deliver a nicotine dose equivalent to 13 to 30 traditional cigarettes, a figure not to be underestimated.

Similarly, hookah delivers comparable nicotine levels, with its smoke containing higher carbon monoxide concentrations, toxicants and carcinogens (such as carcinogenic polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs), aromatic amines, aldehydes, furanic and phenolic compounds, heavy metals, etc.) than cigarette smoke. Smokeless tobacco like chewing tobacco and snuff can lead to cancers of the nasal cavity, oral mucosa, and lips. The risks escalate further when these products are laced with illicit substances, such as etomidate ("space oil") or tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), with dire consequences (for details, please also refer to another article in FP Links "Etomidate Inhalation and Misuse as E-Cigarette Component", issue September 2024).

These marketing strategies not only increase the likelihood of early tobacco exposure among teens but also set the stage for long-term health issues. Globally,

smoking claims 7 million lives annually, with a significant portion attributable to individuals who began smoking in their youth. Reducing adolescent exposure to nicotine and tobacco products has thus become a critical objective of contemporary public health policy.

The 2025 World No Tobacco Day campaign has 3 clear goals: "to raise public awareness by exposing the tobacco industry's manipulative tactics, to advocate for policy reform, and to reduce demand". To elaborate further, the campaign emphasized that Governments should implement measures to ban flavorings and additives in tobacco products that target teens, regulate advertising and promotional strategies, and enforce strict oversight of product design and packaging to reduce their appeal.

Globally, successful tobacco control precedents offer valuable lessons. Australia pioneered the "Plain Packaging" law in 2012, mandating uniform, drab packaging for all tobacco products, stripping away eyecatching designs and instead featuring prominent health warnings. This initiative effectively reduced youth smoking rates and heightened public awareness of smoking's dangers.

Following Australia's lead, numerous countries have adopted similar plain packaging requirements: France (January 2017), the United Kingdom (May 2017), New Zealand (June 2018), Norway (July 2018), Ireland (September 2018), Thailand and Uruguay

(December 2019), Saudi Arabia, Israel, Slovenia, and Turkey (January 2020), Canada (February 2020), Singapore (July 2020), Belgium (January 2021), and the Netherlands (October 2021).

In Hong Kong, we can draw inspiration from these successes to advance more effective tobacco control policies. A collective effort from government, schools, families, and communities is essential to minimize adolescent exposure to tobacco and nicotine products. Only through such collaboration can we create a smokefree environment for the next generation.

但是,成為團隊短板的愧疚感,想快又快不了的無力感,"針草帽"三座大山的壓迫感,幾乎摧毀我






